Reporting Entities

This Statement is made under the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) (the Act) for the financial year ending 30 June 2025 (FY25) and is published by SRG Global Limited (ACN 104 662 259) (SRG Global), and on behalf of all wholly owned entities identified in the Schedule of Reporting Entities set out in Appendix A on page 28.

This Statement does not represent, nor is it intended to cover, any joint venture vehicle or asset which was not either wholly owned or controlled by SRG Global during the reporting period.

In preparing this Statement, SRG Global has considered prior feedback received from the Australian Border Force following the issuance of previous statements of compliance, external published material and by reviewing the statement submissions of our peers. All references to 'us', 'we', 'our' or 'the Company' in this Statement is a reference to SRG Global.

STATEMENT OVERVIEW

MODERN SLAVERY POSITION STATEMENT

SRG Global Limited (**SRG Global, the Company**) operates a centralised corporate governance and risk management framework (**Governance Framework**) which is overseen by our Board of Directors (**Board**). The duties and powers of the Board are identified in the company's Board Charter which confers the role, functions, powers and duties reserved for the Board.

Our Governance Framework is inclusive of various policies, procedures, standards, tools and guidance materials that are applied to all controlled entities and operations. The Board delegates the management and oversight of the Governance Framework to SRG Global's Managing Director, who is then responsible for its administration across all operations via the Executive Leadership Team.

The development, implementation and execution of risk management strategies, including those specific to identify and address modern slavery risks, are uniform across all SRG Global operations.

Our 2025 Modern Slavery Statement (**Statement**) has been prepared with feedback from and consultation with the Managing Director and Executive Leadership Team, commercial representatives, project teams and related internal stakeholders.

STATEMENT OF THE REPORTING ENTITY

SRG Global Limited (ACN 104 662 259) is an Australian company, publicly listed on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX:SRG), registered at Level 2, 500 Hay Street, Subiaco, Western Australia, 6008.

This statement has been developed in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) and sets out the actions taken by SRG Global and its wholly owned and controlled entities (referred to collectively in this statement as 'SRG Global, the 'Group', the 'Company') to identify, assess and address modern slavery risks in its operations and supply chain.

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This Statement was approved by the SRG Global Board of Directors on 27 November 2025 on behalf of itself and the other reporting entities listed in Appendix A (page 28).


STRUCTURE AND OPERATIONS



OUR SUPPLY CHAIN

OVERVIEW

Our suppliers are a critical part of our integrated service delivery model. In FY25, we transacted with more than 3,700 suppliers with the majority of this expenditure with providers domiciled in Australia. Total group expenditure across the SRG Global supply chain to third parties exceeded \$470 million in 12-month reporting period, with 90% of all spend with Australian domiciled enterprises.


PROCUREMENT AND SOURCING

Our operations are located between metropolitan and regional locations, with our procurement requirements ranging from consumable goods to bulk materials and specialised goods or equipment. During FY25, more than 60% of our third-party payments were concentrated across three categories:

Facade Materials

Explosives

As we continue to grow, we are refining our purchasing practices toward a structured “Buy Local” process, focussed on maximizing investment in the communities in which we operate. We recognise that there are limitations to the volume of goods that can be purchased through domestic and local supply chains and continued to take proactive steps to mitigate our exposures to direct and indirect supply chain.

INTERNATIONAL SUPPLY CHAIN PROFILE

Our international supply chain spend for FY25 equated to approximately 10% of group expenditure, with a majority spend with a single territory in China (~88% of all international transactions).

China continues to be a significant supplier of construction products consumed or sourced by the Company (primarily steel and facades), with specialist goods procured from Italy, Germany and the United Kingdom.

To manage our direct exposure to modern slavery risks with foreign parties, we utilise an international prequalification procedure providing greater visibility on the controls and systems in place for direct engagement.

We recognise the use of our international prequalification only covers direct supplier engagements and that these suppliers may source raw goods, materials and services from third parties. To this end we continue to develop processes to improve our data collection on country of manufacture and modern slavery in unrelated third-party transactions.

Supporting our prequalification process, our operations undertake in person engagements with our international supply partners located in India and China. These engagements are undertaken on a minimum timeframe of once every 12 months and include participation from our upstream client partners.

IDENTIFYING RISKS IN OUR SUPPLY CHAIN

SRG Global allocates our exposure to modern slavery risks in two categories:



Direct Employment and Labour Sourcing

Our exposure to Employment and Labour Sourcing includes directly employed labour and third party sourced labour.

As of FY25 we employed ~ 4,500 people across a range of disciplines. All direct employment is governed through common law contracts or industrial awards (as applicable), with third party sourced labour (via agencies) administered under contract.

We continue to monitor and review the effectiveness of our direct employment and labour sourcing arrangements through our Human Resources department.



External Supply Chain

SRG Global delivers specialist engineering and construction services across a number of key markets including water, transport, defense, resources, energy, health, education, specialist facades and complex civil projects.

Each of these projects requires a voluminous amount of fabricated and raw materials, including steel, concrete, and quarried products.

As identified in the overview of our supply chain, the purchase of goods through our indirect supply chain (second tier down) for the fabrication of finished products may be obtained (mined or manufactured) using forced labour.

We are continuing to take steps to improve our understanding and oversight of second, third and fourth-tier supply chain exposures to modern slavery.

Direct Employment and Labour Sourcing

The Company's global workforce of ~4,500 employees are managed through a centralised Human Resources (HR) function. The role of the HR team is to support reporting entities with talent sourcing, recruitment, and management of employee lifecycle. In FY25, all employees were engaged either through Common Law (~33%) or Enterprise Agreements (~67%).

SRG Global's vision is to be an employer of choice. Our workforce is built from a diverse range of

backgrounds who hold unique skills, experience, and views. We believe that this diversity enables us to deliver solutions that keep the complex simple and is built on the foundations of a culture where its employees are encouraged to speak up and raise concerns. This approach is embedded within our Code of Conduct, our policies, and our embedded values – "Live for the challenge, Smarter together, Never give up and Have each other's backs."

External Supply Chain

The Company recognises that the engagement of third parties in its supply chain increases its exposure to modern slavery risks. Our external supply chain remains concentrated with Australia domiciled suppliers, where supplier payments (66% of total spend) are concentrated to a group of 100 suppliers⁴.

Notwithstanding our engagements with Australian registered enterprises, we acknowledge our supply partners include providers of goods and materials which may be sourced from international jurisdictions or industries at higher risk of modern slavery exposures. During FY25, the following areas of expenditure were identified as being at a higher risk:

Purchase Category	Description
Manufacturing	<p>The manufacturing industry is at high risk of exposures to modern slavery conditions. Requirements for individuals to work excessive hours, the use of child or forced labour, debt bondage and unsafe working conditions may be prevalent as operations are frequently located in higher risk jurisdictions.</p> <p>SRG Global procures partially and fully fabricated products from its international supply chain. Common purchased goods include glass, aluminium, steel and fabricated products used within the construction industry. Manufactured goods are primarily sourced from territories with a higher exposure to modern slavery in accordance with the Walk Free Foundation Global Slavery Index.</p> <p>We continue to directly monitor fluctuations in the workloads required of our supply partners to mitigate the exposure to excessive workloads which may increase the pressure on suppliers to meet delivery timeframes.</p>

Construction Materials	<p>Construction materials require higher volumes of raw or partially refined materials. SRG Global's operations require the procurement of glass, cement and aggregates which may be indirectly exposed to modern slavery at their point of extraction. Materials used in construction materials can include raw products extracted through exploitation process including forced and child labour, unskilled or low paid worker, unsafe working conditions and excessive working hours.</p> <p>SRG Global recognises the procurement of construction materials remains a higher exposure to modern slavery and is committed to improving its practices to educate its direct and indirect supply chain to raise awareness and understand the conditions of downstream operations.</p>
Logistics	<p>Goods and materials procured from international jurisdictions are typically sourced through maritime transit. SRG Global recognises the potential to be indirectly exposed to modern slavery risks associated with the use of unskilled workers, forced or indebted labour, required to work excessive hours or be paid below industry standards.</p> <p>SRG Global continues to assess its exposure and indirect modern slavery through its logistics supply chain.</p>
Labour Hire	<p>Our model focuses on direct employment for the delivery of our services. During the reporting period, 3.6% of SRG Global's external supply chain spend was attributed to the engagement of labour hire firms domiciled in Australia. The Company recognises the inherent exposure presented by labour hire firms, however retains a robust contractual and compliance framework of controls to manage its exposure to modern slavery breaches.</p>
Clothing and Textiles	<p>The global apparel industry is a known risk category for exploitation, forced labour and the potential for indirect exposure to modern slavery. Goods are typically sourced from developing nations where there are minimal or inadequate rights to protect employees across raw material production and manufacturing.</p> <p>The use of protective clothing is a requirement for the Company's operations with our spend continuing to rise through organic and acquired growth in our operations.</p> <p>SRG Global continues to prioritise the understanding of indirect exposure to modern slavery for clothing purchases and working with its downstream supply chain to improve transparency of second and third tier exposures.</p>

We continue to improve our understanding of our supply chain through direct and indirect supplier assessments. These reviews enable SRG Global to identify changes in the delivery models used by our suppliers and address concerns should they arise.



Our actions to address modern slavery risks

Our approach to addressing our exposure to modern slavery risks within our supply chain is built upon a process of:

1 Educate

Our mandatory Modern Slavery Training Module completed its fourth year of deployment in FY25. The module forms part of all new employee hires, with existing employees required to complete an annual refresher course - with 100% completion rate achieved for all new starters during the reporting period.

2 Identify

We have taken steps to improve the information we collect from our direct suppliers during onboarding to identify the controls in place to manage their direct exposure to modern slavery risks.

In addition to our onboarding, we are progressing with our External Supply Chain audit, targeting elevated risk industries and major spend supply partners.

3 Assess

In the event a notification of a potential breach is received, or an actual breach occurs, we will investigate the nature of the breach. (Noting no notices of potential breach were received in FY25).

Our audit process is intended to assess the integrity of our supply partner frameworks to manage their exposures to modern slavery.

Where an audit returns a non-conformance, we will work with our supply partners to implement a remediation plan in accordance with step 4.

4 Improve

We recognise that the prevention of modern slavery risks and prevalence is only achieved through a process of continuous improvement. This includes the systems and processes we utilise to educate, identify, and assess our direct and indirect exposures to modern slavery risks.

RISK IDENTIFICATION AND ASSESSMENT

As education remains our first line of defence for in field identification of forced labour and modern slavery identification, our corporate governance framework includes the assessment of our broader pre-existing and newly engaged supply partners. Our identification and assessment framework is segregated into Supplier Grouping and Risk Based Assessment.

SUPPLY PARTNER GROUPING


SRG Global categorises its supply chain partners into two groups:

- **Corporate Supply Partners:** Third party suppliers who provide materials, goods and services to our corporate or office functions.
- **Operational Supply Partners:** Suppliers who provide goods, services and equipment for the delivery of a project.

Whilst we recognise that risk sits across both partner categories, we further consider the level of influence our purchasing power to influence change. Refer to our section on Governance and Responsibilities for more information on how SRG Global manages its broad exposures to modern slavery.

SUPPLY PARTNER RISK ASSESSMENT

Following the initial grouping of our supply partners, we then group our supply chain by:



The outcome of this assessment enables a ranking to be produced on the perceived or plausible risk of modern slavery arising from the engagement of a supplier. For suppliers who score highly in two of three categories, an engagement and assessment plan will be developed to review and assess the existing controls and processes of the supply partner to manage its own and downstream risks.

GOVERNANCE AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Modern slavery risks in our supply chain are overseen through a robust governance model aligned with our enterprise risk management framework.

SRG Global's Board of Directors (**Board**) retain oversight for the performance of our risk management systems and controls. Supporting the Board is our Executive Leadership Team who, led by our Managing Director, is responsible for the implementation of our framework.

The management of our exposure to modern slavery risks is administered through our operations to maximise the use of available resources. Administrative tools and resources are developed through our corporate governance framework, delivered at a group level.

Documents comprising of our governance framework relating to the management of modern slavery risks include:

Supplier Code of Conduct (Supplier Code)	Introduced in 2022, our Supplier Code of Conduct builds upon our company Code and establishes the minimum expectations of our supply chain partners when engaging with SRG Global. Central to the Supplier Code of Conduct is ensuring our supply partners meet their corporate responsibility including Human Rights and Modern Slavery compliance.
Corporate Policies	Including our Sustainability, Diversity and Inclusion, Health Safety and Quality, Respect@SRG and Ant-Bribery and Corruption. Each policy establishes our commitment to undertake our operations in an ethical and transparent way.
Downstream Contracts	SRG Global utilises a suite of contracts to manage our downstream supply chain. All contracts include specific conditions and warranties prohibiting the use of modern slavery within delivery models.
Procurement Policy	In 2024, SRG Global updated its Procurement Policy with training sessions held with all business units to promote awareness of the policy and its influence on group purchasing.



REPORTING

During the reporting period, SRG Global conducted a review of its Whistleblower Policy and Process which remains its primary method for raising concerns attributed to modern slavery within its supply chain.

The outcome identified no deficiencies within the reporting framework. SRG Global however will continue to review and continue to educate its direct workforce and supply chain to promote active awareness and use of the Whistleblower Policy to raise any concerns should they arise.

SUPPLIER PREQUALIFICATION

The use of Supplier Prequalifications continue to remain a control mechanism for SRG Global to address its exposures to modern slavery within its supply chain. During the reporting period SRG Global commenced a renewal review of its high-risk international supply chain, re-issuing prequalification documents.

During FY26, SRG Global will undertake in person audits on each high-risk international supplier to satisfy itself of their continued compliance.


Domestically, a broader assessment will be completed on its approved supply chain through the use of SRG Global's vendor management software. It is expected an audit target of more than 1,000 active suppliers will be achieved.

Suppliers considered at higher risk (due to compliance or control concerns) will be considered for further assessment and/or review.

COMPLIANCE ASSESSMENT

During FY25, SRG Global developed a Modern Slavery Scorecard (Scorecard) design to enhance our understanding of our exposures to modern slavery. The objective of the scorecard is to provide individuals with responsibility to assess modern slavery compliance with a structured framework to determine compliance.

The Scorecard will form an integral part of SRG Global's review and compliance framework during the FY26 reporting period.



EDUCATION AND AWARENESS

Supporting our Scorecard and review process is the use of an internal modern slavery education program targeting our workforce. The delivery of our training caters for the diverse array of our operations, as both a virtual and face to face toolbox presentations.

Key messages of the training package include awareness and how our workforce can notify of concerns.

Assessing the effectiveness of our actions

We are committed to continuously improving our approach to the identification and management of the risks of modern slavery within our operations and supply chains. As we continue to grow as a business, we are proactively implementing processes that deliver greater visibility and awareness.

In considering the effectiveness of our actions, we also account for the diversity of our operational footprint, available resources and breadth of our supply chain.

Our focus for FY25 remained centred on process improvement. Key achievements include:

- Improving our supplier application procedure to increase the quality of information received and enabling greater transparency on modern slavery controls through the use of third-party vendor management software.
- The development of a Supplier Modern Slavery Scorecard.
- Commencing a renewed review of our higher exposed international supply chain.

4. Commence development of a Supplier approval matrix for high-risk industries.
