CEO'S MESSAGE

On behalf of DRA Australia Pty Ltd, I am pleased to present our Modern Slavery Statement for the financial year ended 31 December 2025.

Modern slavery remains one of the most significant human rights challenges facing the global economy. Despite increased awareness, evolving regulations, and growing stakeholder expectations, risks of forced labour, human trafficking, debt bondage, and other forms of exploitation continue to exist across global supply chains and business operations.

As a global engineering, project delivery, and operations management partner to the mining and minerals industry, DRA recognises its responsibility to identify, assess, and address modern slavery risks within our operations and supply chains. Our commitment extends beyond compliance with legislative requirements. It reflects our broader commitment to conducting business ethically, respecting human rights, and creating sustainable value for our stakeholders.

During FY25, we continued to strengthen the governance frameworks, policies, and due diligence processes that support our approach to managing modern slavery risks. These efforts are guided by our governance framework and broader risk management framework, which together establish clear expectations for our employees, contractors, suppliers, and business partners.

Safety remains fundamental to our culture and operations. We recognise that unsafe, coercive, or exploitative working conditions are often indicators of broader human rights concerns. By promoting safe workplaces, ethical labour practices, transparent reporting mechanisms, and responsible supply chain management, we seek to foster an environment where people are treated with dignity, fairness, and respect.

Addressing modern slavery requires ongoing vigilance, collaboration, and continuous improvement. We remain committed to strengthening our risk management processes, enhancing awareness across our business, and working with suppliers, clients, and communities to support responsible business practices throughout the value chain.

I would like to thank our employees and business partners for their continued commitment to upholding DRA's values and maintaining the high ethical standards expected throughout the DRA Group.

1. ABOUT THIS STATEMENT

This Modern Slavery Statement (“Statement”) has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) (the “Act”) and the United Kingdom Modern Slavery Act 2015.

Although this Statement is submitted by DRA Australia Pty Ltd (“DRA Australia”, “DRA”, “we”, “our” or “us”) as the reporting entity under the Act, it addresses the operations, workforce and supply chains of the broader DRA Group during FY25. This approach reflects DRA Australia’s position as the parent entity of the DRA group of companies (“DRA Group”) during the reporting period, prior to the implementation of the corporate restructuring described in Section 1.5 and is consistent with DRA’s previous Modern Slavery reporting.

This Statement describes:

- The DRA Group’s structure, operations, and supply chain;
- the risks of modern slavery in our operations and supply chains;
- the actions taken to assess and address those risks;
- how we assess the effectiveness of those actions; and
- the consultation process undertaken in preparing this Statement.

1.1 REPORTING PERIOD AND REPORTING ENTITY

This Statement covers FY25 and applies to DRA Australia (ACN 622 581 935), formerly known as DRA Global Limited, and the entities it controls unless otherwise stated.

References in this Statement to a ‘year’ are to the financial year ended 31 December 2025 (“FY25”) unless stated otherwise.

During FY25, the DRA Group operated across four operating segments: EMEA (Europe, Middle East and Africa, including SENET), Minopex, APAC (Asia-Pacific), and AMER (North and South America).

All dollar figures are in Australian dollars unless stated otherwise.

The reporting entities covered by this Statement are listed in Appendix 1.

1.2 REPORTING REQUIREMENT

For FY25, DRA is a reporting entity under the Act. As a reporting entity, DRA is required to prepare an annual Modern Slavery Statement describing the risks of modern slavery practices within our operations and supply chains, and the actions taken to assess and address those risks. Accordingly, this Statement has been prepared in accordance with the mandatory reporting criteria prescribed under section 16 of the Act.

Following DRA’s delisting and subsequent changes to its corporate structure, DRA does not presently expect to meet the reporting thresholds that would require mandatory submission of a Modern Slavery Statement under the Act in future reporting periods.

Notwithstanding this position, DRA recognises that responsible supply chain management, respect for human rights, and the prevention of modern slavery remain important considerations for our business, clients, employees, suppliers, and other stakeholders. As a global engineering, project delivery, and operations management

partner to the mining and minerals sector, we continue to operate across jurisdictions, industries, and supply chains where human rights risks may arise.

Transparent disclosure of our approach to managing modern slavery risks remains commercially and operationally important. Expectations relating to human rights due diligence, ethical sourcing, and responsible business conduct continue to evolve across the mining sector, particularly among multinational clients and business partners that remain subject to modern slavery and broader sustainability reporting obligations.

This Statement therefore serves a dual purpose:

- Fulfilling DRA’s final mandatory reporting obligation under the Act; and
- Providing a foundation for any future voluntary disclosures relating to human rights, modern slavery risk management, and responsible supply chain practices that DRA may elect to undertake.

1.3 CONSULTATION

This Statement was developed through consultation with relevant business units, operational regions, and functional teams across the DRA Group.

Consultation included engagement with representatives from the areas:

- legal and compliance;
- procurement and supply chain;
- human resources;
- sustainability;
- risk and governance; and
- operational leadership.

The Board of Directors and Executive management provided oversight during the preparation and approval of this Statement.

1.4 OUR COMMITMENT

DRA is committed to conducting business ethically, responsibly, and with respect for human rights.

We do not tolerate any form of modern slavery, including forced labour, child labour, debt bondage, servitude, deceptive recruitment practices, or human trafficking, within our operations or supply chains.

Our approach is guided by:

- our Code of Conduct;
- Supplier Code of Conduct;
- Human Rights and Modern Slavery Standard;
- procurement and due diligence policies, procedures and processes; and
- broader governance and risk management frameworks.

We recognise that modern slavery risks can arise across global operations and supply chains, particularly within high-risk industries, regions, and labour-intensive activities. We are committed to identifying, assessing, and addressing these risks through ongoing due diligence and continuous improvement.

1.5 JURISDICTIONAL TRANSITION – CHANGE IN CORPORATE STRUCTURE

Our reporting boundaries and regulatory context have undergone a material transition.

1.5.1.1 SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN THE STATE OF AFFAIRS

On 6 January 2025, DRA delisted from both the ASX and JSE stock exchanges.

As announced on 12 March 2025, the proposed acquisition of DRA Australia (formerly DRA Global Limited) by DRA Limited (“DRAL”) (formerly Apex Capital Partners Limited) would be conducted by way of a scheme of arrangement under Part 5.1 of the Corporations Act 2001 between DRA Australia and its shareholders (DRA Shareholders), pursuant to which DRAL would acquire 100% of the fully paid ordinary shares in DRA Australia. The scheme of arrangement was implemented on 20 October 2025 with all shares of DRA Australia transferred to DRAL.

On 13 January 2026, confirmation was received from ASIC confirming DRA Australia’s request to change its year end from 31 December to 30 June.

There were no other significant changes in the state of affairs for DRA Australia during the financial year.

1.5.1.2 DISPOSAL OF UMM CONTRACTING SERVICES

On 28 November, Minopex Mining Operations (Pty) Ltd entered into a Sale of Shares agreement, to dispose of its 60% share in UMM Contracting Services (Pty) Ltd to Mahu Holdings (Pty) Ltd. The sale became effective on 19 December 2025.

1.5.1.3 EVENTS AFTER THE REPORTING PERIOD

No matter or circumstance has arisen since 31 December 2025 that has significantly affected, or may significantly affect our consolidated operations, the results of those operations, or the consolidated state of affairs in future financial years, other than those items mentioned below.

1.5.1.4 UNBUNDLING OF DRA GROUP HOLDINGS (PTY) LTD AND DRA SHARED SERVICES (PTY) LTD

On 2 January 2026, the unbundling of DRA Group Holdings (Pty) Ltd and DRA Shared Services SA (Pty) Ltd from DRA Australia to DRA Limited, became effective.

1.5.1.5 NAME CHANGE OF HOLDING COMPANY

On 6 March 2026, Apex Capital Partners Ltd, which holds 100% of the issued share capital of DRA Australia, changed its name to DRA Limited.

1.5.1.6 CHANGES TO DRA’S GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE

Following the completion of the scheme of arrangement transaction, the governance structure of the DRA Group was updated to reflect the establishment of a new ultimate holding company. DRAL assumed the role of ultimate parent entity, with a newly constituted Board providing oversight of the DRA Group, including DRA Australia. This transition resulted in changes to the Board composition and governance oversight arrangements, aligning the DRA Group’s corporate structure with its re-domiciliation to South Africa and reinforcing centralised strategic and governance oversight at the ultimate holding company level.

1.6 APPROVAL

This Statement was approved by the Board of Directors of DRA Australia Pty Limited on 26 June 2026.

2. WE ARE DRA

DRA Australia is incorporated in Australia and headquartered in Perth, Western Australia. Through its Projects and Operations divisions, the DRA Group delivers multi-disciplinary engineering, project delivery, and operations management services to the mining, minerals, and metals industry across multiple regions and jurisdictions.

Our integrated business model enables us to support clients throughout the entire project lifecycle, from concept and feasibility studies through to project execution, commissioning, and ongoing operations. Drawing on deep technical expertise, our teams develop innovative solutions in mining, mineral processing, infrastructure, water, and energy.

During FY25, DRA continued to strengthen its capabilities, geographic reach, and project delivery expertise, reinforcing its position as a trusted partner to the global mining and minerals sector. This progress reflects our commitment to creating sustainable value for our clients, communities, employees, and shareholders.

Our people are guided by our values, which underpin the way we conduct business and support our commitment to ethical and responsible operations.

Key trading names within the Group include DRA, SENET and Minopex.

The DRA Group delivers services across the mining and minerals processing project lifecycle, including:

- studies and engineering;

Our supply chain includes both local and international suppliers, including contractors, consultants, manufacturers, and service providers.

3. STRENGTHENING RESPONSIBLE SUPPLY CHAIN PRACTICES

DRA recognises that effective management of modern slavery risks extends beyond our own operations and into the relationships we maintain across our supply chain. We are committed to embedding responsible procurement practices that support respect for human rights, ethical business conduct, and accountability throughout our supplier network.

Our approach focuses on integrating modern slavery considerations into third-party onboarding, due diligence, risk assessments, and ongoing engagement processes. Through the implementation of governance standards, third-party screening activities, training initiatives, and procurement controls, we seek to identify, assess, and address potential risks within our supply chain in a proportionate and risk-based manner.

We continue to strengthen our procurement framework and third-party oversight mechanisms to promote transparency, improve risk visibility, and support informed decision-making. By working collaboratively with third parties and business partners, we aim to foster responsible business practices that contribute to resilient supply chains and align with DRA's commitment to ethical and sustainable operations.

SUPPLIER SPEND

DRA procures a broad range of goods and services to support the delivery of our projects and ongoing business operations. Our supplier base includes local businesses, regional providers, and multinational organisations operating across a variety of sectors and jurisdictions.

During FY25, the DRA Group's procurement spend totalled approximately \$351 million across 3,279 suppliers located in 42 countries. This expenditure supported activities across our engineering, project delivery, corporate, and operational functions.

Understanding the geographic distribution and nature of our supplier spend is an important component of our modern slavery risk assessment process, helping us identify areas that may require enhanced due diligence, supplier engagement, or ongoing monitoring.

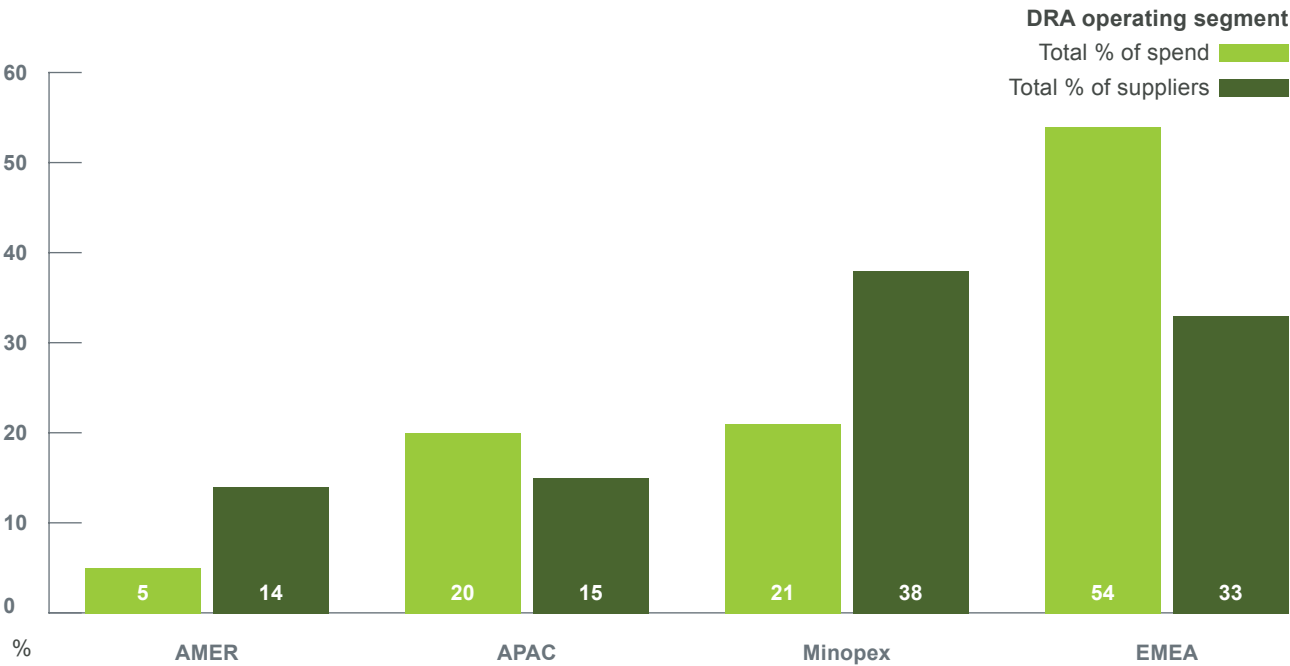


Figure 2: Supplier spend by global region (as a % of total supplier spend)

Figures 1 and 2 provide a breakdown of supplier spend by operating segment and region, respectively.

Figure 1: Supplier Spend by Operating Segment (as a % total supplier spend)

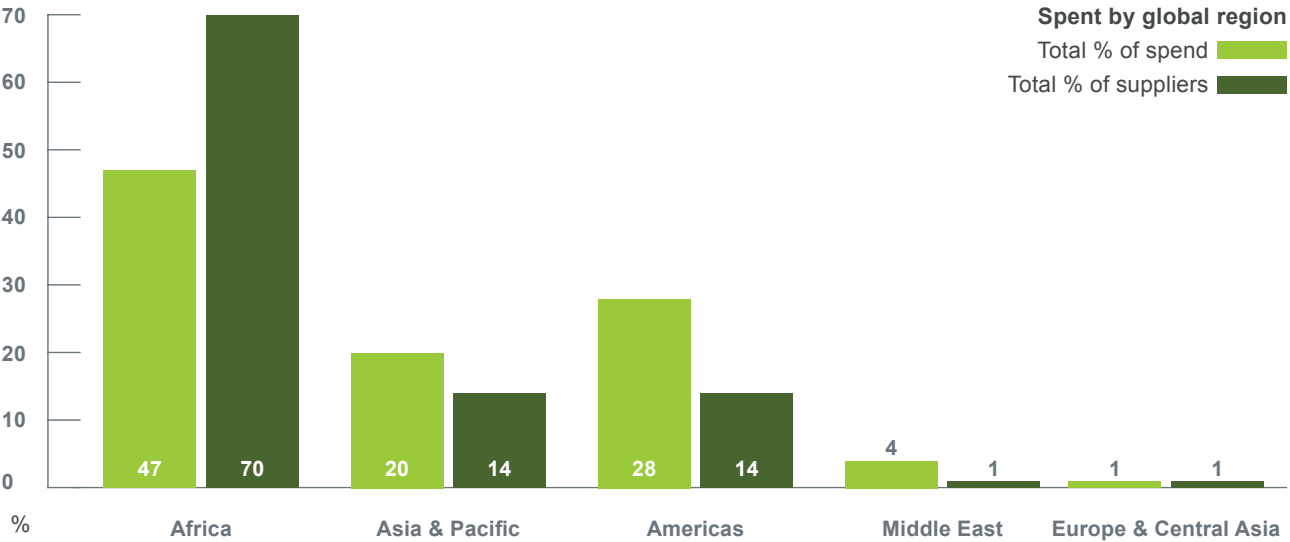
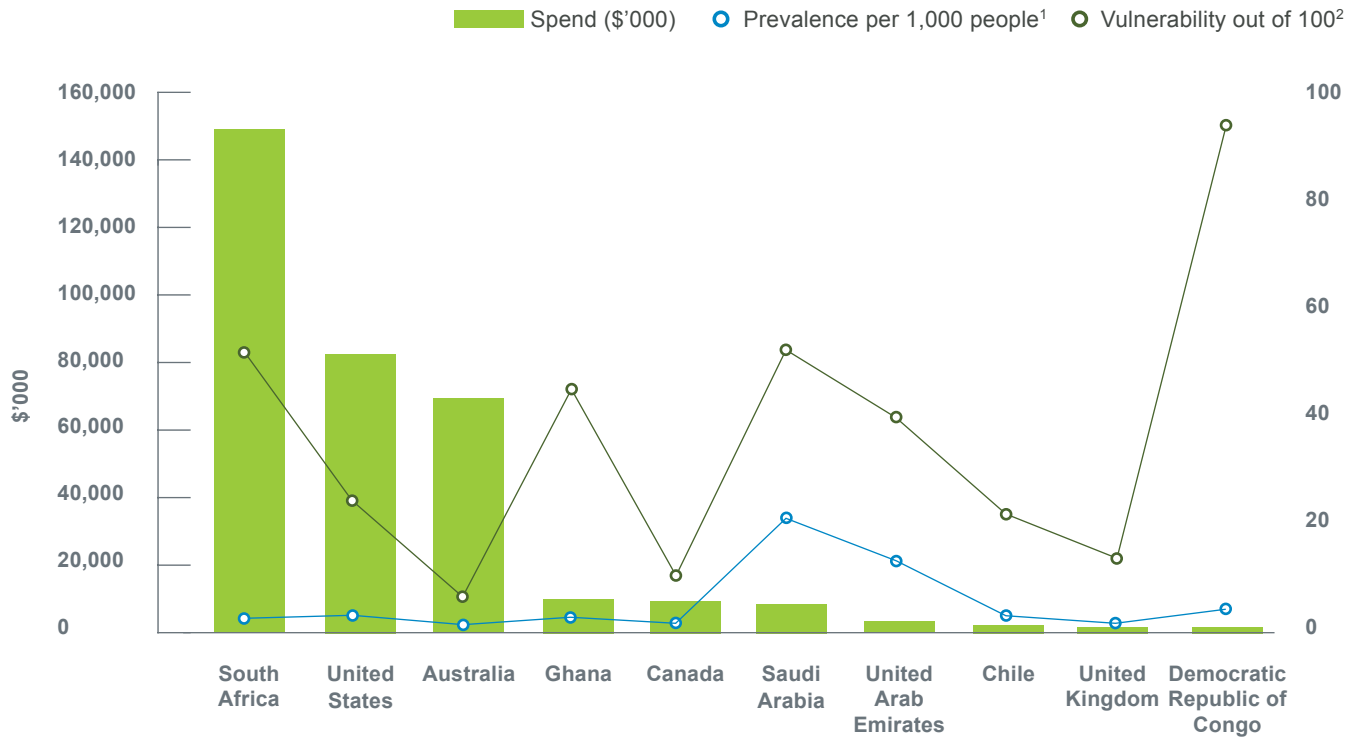


Figure 3 presents the DRA Group's top 10 sourcing countries by supplier spend in FY25. Together, these countries represented approximately 97% of total procurement spend, with South Africa, the United States of America and Australia accounting for 86% of the total.

To support our understanding of geographic modern slavery risks within the supply chain, the figure also includes each country's modern slavery prevalence and vulnerability scores, based on data published in the Global Slavery Index³. These indicators help inform our risk-based approach to supplier due diligence, screening, and ongoing monitoring activities.

SUPPORTING RESPONSIBLE LOCAL PROCUREMENT

The DRA Group recognises that local procurement can play an important role in promoting sustainable economic participation and reducing social vulnerabilities within the communities in which we operate. Where practical and appropriate, we seek to engage local suppliers and service providers, supporting opportunities for businesses located near our project sites to participate in our supply chain.

Our approach extends beyond procurement spend and includes supplier engagement, communication of our expectations regarding ethical business conduct, and support for suppliers in understanding and meeting our standards. By fostering transparent and responsible supplier relationships, we aim to strengthen supply chain resilience, encourage responsible employment practices, and contribute to positive outcomes for workers and communities.

Through these efforts, the DRA Group seeks to build supply chains that are not only operationally effective, but also aligned with our commitment to respect human rights and address modern slavery risks across our operations and business relationships.

4. RISK MANAGEMENT

DRA recognises that modern slavery risks may exist within both our operations and supply chains. As a global engineering, project delivery, and operations management business operating across multiple jurisdictions, we may be exposed to risks through our workforce, suppliers, subcontractors, and broader business relationships.

Our approach is guided by a risk-based framework that considers country and sector risk, supplier and contractor risk, workforce and labour practices, operational context, and the nature of goods and services procured. While we consider the risk of directly causing modern slavery within our operations to be low, we acknowledge that risks may arise indirectly through our supply chains and third-party business relationships.

Table 1 summarises the key modern slavery risk areas identified by DRA, together with the actions taken to assess and address those risks and the mechanisms used to evaluate effectiveness.

3.1 GOVERNANCE AND DUE DILIGENCE

DRA maintains governance frameworks and due diligence processes designed to support ethical business conduct and respect for human rights. These include our Code of Conduct, Supplier Code of Conduct, Human Rights and Modern Slavery Standard, procurement and due diligence procedures, Risk Management Framework, and Speak-Up mechanisms.

Modern slavery risks are managed through DRA's Risk Management Framework and supported by due diligence processes, procurement controls, governance standards, and reporting mechanisms. We provide training and awareness initiatives to relevant employees to support understanding of human rights obligations, modern slavery risks and indicators, ethical business conduct, and reporting pathways. Where appropriate, awareness activities may also be extended to suppliers, contractors, and business partners.

DRA maintains reporting and grievance mechanisms that enable employees and stakeholders to raise concerns regarding potential human rights violations, unethical conduct, or modern slavery risks. Reports are reviewed and addressed in accordance with established internal processes.

During FY25, DRA was not aware of any incidents (confirmed or otherwise) of modern slavery within its operations or supply chain.

3.2 INTEGRATION WITH ENTERPRISE RISK MANAGEMENT

Modern slavery risks are considered within DRA's broader enterprise risk management framework and may be assessed at the following levels:

- **Strategic level:** Considering human rights and modern slavery risks arising from DRA's operating footprint, business relationships, supply chains, and regulatory environment.
- **Operational level:** Assessing workforce, labour hire, contractor, supplier, and business partner risks across DRA's operations and support functions.
- **Project level:** Evaluating modern slavery and human rights risks associated with project locations, procurement activities, subcontracting arrangements, and project delivery requirements.

3.3 ASSESSING EFFECTIVENESS

DRA is committed to the continuous improvement of our approach to identifying, assessing, and addressing modern slavery risks across our operations and supply chains. We regularly review the effectiveness of our governance frameworks, due diligence processes, and risk management activities to ensure our controls remain appropriate and effective.

DRA's Board and Audit and Risk Committee receive regular updates on modern slavery-related matters, enabling oversight of our risk management approach and supporting the ongoing evaluation of measures implemented to prevent and mitigate modern slavery risks. Material risks may be escalated through management, the Social and Ethics Committee, the Audit and Risk Committee, and ultimately the Board, as appropriate, ensuring effective governance and oversight of modern slavery risk management.

To assess the effectiveness of our actions, DRA considers:

- the implementation and periodic review of relevant policies, standards, and governance frameworks;
- third-party onboarding, screening, and due diligence activities;
- procurement and third-party risk assessment processes;
- employee training and awareness initiatives relating to human rights and modern slavery;
- reports received through grievance, whistleblowing, and Speak-Up mechanisms;
- investigations, corrective actions, and remediation activities, where required;
- outcomes of management reviews and governance oversight processes; and
- ongoing evaluation of modern slavery risks within our operations, supply chains, and business relationships.

3.4 PROGRESS ON OUR COMMITMENT TO HUMAN RIGHTS

Over the past several years, DRA has continued to strengthen its modern slavery and human rights framework by delivering on a range of key commitments. This has included updating and publishing governance standards, rolling out employee training, and strengthening procurement and business partner due diligence requirements. DRA has also enhanced its third-party screening and monitoring processes, developed a risk-based audit framework, and introduced reporting mechanisms to support ongoing oversight and continuous improvement. These initiatives have further embedded modern slavery risk management across our operations, procurement activities, and supply chain governance processes.
