

MODERN SLAVERY ACT REPORTING STATEMENT YEAR ENDING 30 JUNE 2020

OVERVIEW

The Modern Slavery Act 2018 was passed by the Australian Federal Government in November 2018 and requires all Australian resident companies that have consolidated revenue in excess of A\$100M to provide the Australian Government with a Statement setting out how Sutton Tools meets the 7 reporting criteria during each reporting period. As an Australian resident company operating on a standard financial year, a report must be provided no later than Wednesday 31 March 2021 for the income year ending 30 June 2020.

Following are the 7 Mandatory Criteria:

- 1. Identify the Reporting Entity.
- 2. Describe the Reporting Entity's Operating Structure.
- 3. Describe the risks of modern slavery practices in the operations and supply chain of the reporting entity and any entities it owns or controls.
- 4. Describe the actions taken by the reporting entity and any entities it owns or controls to assess and address these risks, including due diligence and remediation process.
- 5. Describe how the reporting entity assesses the effectiveness of these actions.
- 6. Describe the process of consultation with any entities the reporting entity owns or controls.
- 7. Provide any other relevant information.

1. Identify the Reporting Entity

Summary

Sutton Tools was founded in 1917 and remains an Australian family business that is renowned for its high-quality power tool accessories and cutting tools for the hardware market and a wide range of specialized industrial applications. Sutton Tools manufactures cutting tools at two sites across Victoria, both for the domestic market and for export. The bulk of general production occurs at the head office site at Thomastown, in Melbourne's northern suburbs, with more specialized operations centered at our Maryborough facility. Overseas production plants are also located in Kaiapoi, New Zealand and Distribution facilities in Auckland and the Netherlands.

Sutton Tools has addressed concerns and risks relating to Modern Slavery with our Suppliers in accordance with the code of conduct and are compliant with the Modern Slavery Act.

Due Diligence is carried out annually via correspondence, visitation and audits.

Sutton Tools has a total of 413 Staff located in Australia, New Zealand, Europe and Asia.
