

# Modern Slavery Statement 30 June 2022

#### Introduction:

Modern slavery is a pervasive yet often hidden issue within global supply chains and has severe and devastating consequences for victims. We welcome the Australian Government's efforts to help Australian businesses prevent modern slavery in domestic and global supply chains.

This statement details the operations of ARDEX Australia Pty Ltd together with potential modern slavery risks which may exist within its business, and actions aimed identifying and eliminating slavery within its supply chain. ARDEX recognises there is no simple solution to eliminate the risks of modern slavery from its business and will refine its approach and processes and measure the effectiveness of these over the coming years to strengthen its response against modern slavery.

## Identification of reporting entity

This statement relates to ARDEX Australia Pty Ltd (ABN: 82 000 550 005) and is prepared in accordance with the criteria set out in the *Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth)*, relating to or the actions and activities during the calendar year 2021 (January 2021 to December 2021).

The registered office is located at Unit 7, 20 Powers Road Seven Hills NSW 2147.

## ARDEX Australia's Structure, Operations and Supply Chain:

## **Company Overview and Structure**

**ARDEX Australia** is an industry leader in product innovation and development, range, and supply and distribution to multiple market channels, offering engineered products and systems in the applications for floor levelling and adhesives, tile and natural stone systems, sheet and liquid applied waterproofing membranes, general construction and decorative surfaces.

With sales, distribution and manufacturing across Australia ARDEX strives to provide its customers with industry-leading service, expert advice, and quality products. Since its establishment, company has experienced strong growth and continues to grow through strategic acquisitions and core business model.



ARDEX Australia has more than 220 employees across all its Australian locations, generating in excess of \$100 million in sales annually.

## **Operation and Supply Chain**

ARDEX Australia has sales, manufacturing, and distribution facilities in all mainland state capital cities. The Head Office site personnel perform national roles in areas of general management, human resources, marketing, finance, operations, supply chain and procurement, and product development and technical services. The functional heads of these teams form the Leadership team of the business, reporting directly to the Managing Director.

ARDEX Australia recognises that only through the joint commitment of all supply partners can we be sure that any form of modern slavery is eradicated. Our suppliers span Globally and locally and ARDEX Australia maintains a close and ongoing dialogue with its suppliers, partners, and customers.

Our procurement activities include supply from local manufacturers and distributors, as well as from overseas suppliers to support our manufacturing operations in Australia.

The number of our suppliers according to geographic region are:

- Europe 16
- America 5
- Asia 7
- Oceania 164

In addition to manufacturing and distribution, ARDEX procures various services including transport, freight and shipping, IT, and other ancillary services.

Our supply chain team focuses on building long term sustainable partnerships with suppliers and seeking innovative opportunities to ensure reliability and excellence in both product and delivery of service to customer.


## Risks of modern slavery practices in ARDEX operations and supply chains:

ARDEX Australia has undertaken an analysis of its operations and supply chain to identify potential risk of modern slavery.



As with many other companies operating in our sector, the risk of modern slavery is heightened in our supply chain particularly beyond tier 1 suppliers as transparency of conduct and transparency of risks gradually diminishes. ARDEX looked at the potential risks in the supply chain by comparison against commonly published modern slavery risks according to sector or industry type, geographic or demographic risks, vulnerable populations and entity or business structure types where applicable.

The following areas have been identified as having the risk of modern slavery impacts in our operations and supply chain particular in tier 2 and beyond as ARDEX has direct relationship with Tier 1 suppliers.



 Unknown origin of raw material or intermediate components used to manufacture imported finished goods, high risk manufacturing countries such as China, Vietnam, and India where lower tier suppliers not visible.



 Migrant labour exploitation; skilled labour for manufacturing and warehousing functions.

#### NOTE

The foregoing repeats similar sections of our 30 June 2021 Modern Slavery Report ("2020 Report") as various matters referred to therein remain same during the year under review.

## Actions taken to address key identified modern slavery risks:

In FY 2022 ARDEX developed a Modern Slavery Policy that seeks to formalise our approach to identifying, assessing, and addressing Modern Slavery risk. This will be reviewed annually and refined as we continue to develop our approach.

ARDEX Australia acknowledges the increased pressure that COVID-19 pandemic has created on global and domestic supply chains which could have a flow on impact related to Modern Slavery risk. We continue to maintain strong relationships and open communications with suppliers about these risks.

We understand the importance of working collaboratively with our employees, suppliers, and the broader industry to combat Modern Slavery. We continue to take steps to assess and address Modern Slavery in our operations and supply chains.

As stated in 2020 Modern Slavery report, we undertook a detailed key supplier survey and undertook an initial risk assessment to identify key Modern Slavery risk existing within our operations and supply chains. In FY22, we repeated the supplier questionnaire to identify new or changed Modern Slavery risk with new and existing suppliers.

## **Supplier Due Diligence**

ARDEX is in the process of updating its Manufacturing and Supply agreements with key strategic partners by inserting specific clauses in relation to modern slavery to ensure suppliers:

- · comply with Australian and international modern slavery laws relevant to the supplier.
- allow ARDEX to investigate and verify compliance with Australian and international modern slavery laws.
- provide information regarding itself and each of its suppliers involved in producing or procuring goods and services for supply to ARDEX.



- confirm that neither the supplier nor any of its officers, agents or employees has been convicted or investigated for any offence in connection with any Australian or international modern slavery laws; and
- confirm implementation of anti-modern slavery policies and due diligence procedures.

Based on the FY21 survey results, 19.14% of suppliers meet the criteria requiring submission of a Modern Slavery Statement under the Act, and of these suppliers, 90.00% have high-moderate visibility of their supply chain. Of the remaining 80.86% of suppliers surveyed, 68.93% also reported having a moderate to high visibility of their supply chain.

#### **Policies**

In FY22, ARDEX has developed/updated following policies that describe our approach to the identification of Modern Slavery risks and steps to be taken to prevent slavery and human trafficking in its operations.

- Modern Slavery Policy: This policy establishes our commitment to addressing Modern Slavery risk in our business and driving ethical business practices across our organisation and supply chain.
- Speak Up Program: This program encourages and provides a safe and confidential
  channel for any employee to raise and have formally addressed any concerns directly
  to management regarding any aspect of the business operations. This program would
  be how employees would raise any concerns regarding modern slavery within
  ARDEX's the supply chain.
- ARDEX Group Ethics Guidelines: Corporate ethics guidelines provide binding
  instructions regarding the ethical obligations to be observed by ARDEX employees and
  are designed to serve as a support for employees. These corporate ethics guidelines
  represent a framework providing minimum standards for all companies of the ARDEX
  Group.
- Supplier code of conduct: We are committed to ensuring that its suppliers adhere to
  the highest standards of ethics. Suppliers are required to demonstrate that they provide
  safe working conditions where necessary, treat workers with dignity and respect, and
  act ethically and within all applicable laws in their use of labour. We work with suppliers
  to ensure that they meet the standards of the code and improve their worker's working



conditions. However, serious violations of our supplier code of conduct will lead to the termination of the business relationship.

Recruitment/Agency workers policy: We use only reputable employment agencies
 to source labour. It is a requirement of the Agency to pay labour hire employees on
 assignment to ARDEX in accordance with the applicable Modern Award provisions to
 the Site in which they are working.

## Assessing effectiveness of actions:

ARDEX Australia acknowledges that combatting modern slavery requires ongoing commitment. ARDEX Australia will continue to comply with the Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) and produce an annual statement reporting on risks within our operations and supply chains, and actions we have taken to mitigate these risks and the effectiveness of those actions.

Based on the results of the FY21 supplier survey, we assess the risk of Modern Slavery within our business operations to be low.

We are further reviewing the effectiveness of the actions and controls implemented within our processes relating to our modern slavery risks and the above-referenced development of the questionnaire approach.
