Aussie Broadband's Modern Slavery Statement

Aussie Broadband Limited (ABN 29 132 090 192) (Aussie Broadband) is subject to the requirements of the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) and will incorporate these requirements into its Annual Modern Slavery Statement.

This Modern Slavery Statement relates to the financial year 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025.

CEO statement



Aussie Broadband rejects modern slavery in all its forms. Our commitment to human rights and the prevention of modern slavery has never been stronger. In FY25, we took important steps to embed these values throughout our organisation and operations.

In May 2025, we launched our Human Rights Policy, formalising our commitment to respecting human rights across all our business relationships and supply chains. This policy reflects our determination to act with integrity in all business relationships and to respect human rights for every person Aussie Broadband has contact with.

Our FY25 Sustainability Report marks a significant milestone in our journey. Human rights and modern slavery were identified as high priority issues in our materiality assessment, reflecting both stakeholder expectations and our own recognition that these issues are fundamental to who we are as an organisation. This has elevated our focus on rejecting modern slavery in all its forms and strengthened our efforts to identify and address risks across our operations and supply chains.

This year we continued to update our supplier vetting processes and implemented enhanced due diligence tools. This technology supports our ongoing commitment to understanding who we do business with and ensuring the integrity of our supplier relationships.

In February 2025, in collaboration with industry working groups, we proudly launched the Pathway to Respecting Human Rights and Addressing Modern

Slavery Risks Handbook. It shares practical and actionable steps telcos, and importantly our suppliers, can take to identifying key strengths and opportunities to help reduce the risk of modern slavery within our operations and supply chains. It outlines obligations relevant to organisation size, shares key resources and checklists, and spotlights current industry action in practice.

We continued our ongoing industry collaboration through Modern Slavery Roundtables and working groups and enabled our staff to have greater awareness and understanding of the risks around modern slavery through our capability and enablement education platform. This allows our people the opportunity to be more involved in the identification and management of these risks.

Aussie Broadband has zero tolerance for modern slavery anywhere in our business or supply chain, and we are fully committed to continuous improvement.

FY25 Attestation

To date, Aussie Broadband has not had any issues raised with it or reported to it regarding modern slavery or human trafficking or human rights associated directly with its operations or its supply chain. The Board of Aussie Broadband Limited approved this statement in December 2025.

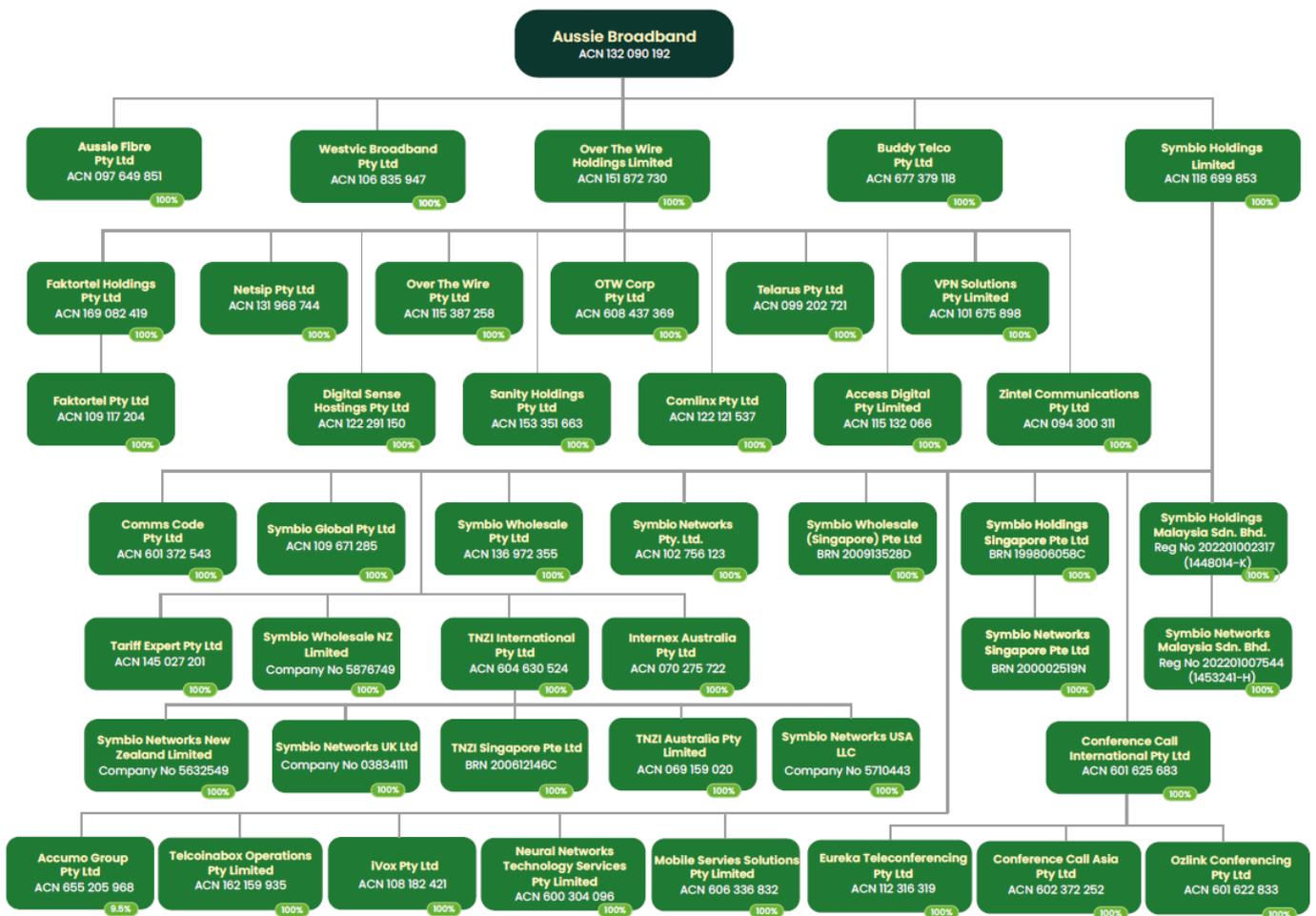
Aussie Broadband's structure, operations, and supply chains.

Aussie Broadband is the fifth largest retail internet service provider in Australia, delivering over one million services, including more than 780,000 broadband connections (8.4% share of NBN services as at June 2025), serving residential, business, enterprise, government, and wholesale customers. Aussie operates its own fibre network, is a Tier-1 voice carrier in Australia, and supports mobile services via the Optus network.

Aussie Broadband began in 2003, in regional Victoria, and is one of the largest employers in the Latrobe Valley region. Symbio Holdings Limited is the parent entity of a global group of companies known as Symbio Group which includes its Australian, New Zealand, Malaysian, Singapore, US and UK based subsidiaries.

Our customer service centres are primarily located in Australia, with contact centres in Dandenong South and Morwell (Victoria) and Perth (Western Australia), supported by offices in Adelaide, Brisbane, Darwin, Melbourne, and Sydney. To maintain a global 24/7 presence, we also have a customer-facing team in the United Kingdom. Additionally, teams in New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia and the Philippines focus on channel sales, finance, and operational support.

Operations

Aussie Broadband's operating segments are presented below:

- **Residential:** includes services to residential customers, including fixed broadband, telephony, mobile, and other value-added services. The residential segment continues to grow and provide market-leading customer service and user experience.
- **Business:** includes services to small and medium-sized businesses. Services include connectivity, mobile, voice and support services, leveraging our technology and customer service know-how to deliver product offerings and exceptional customer service.
- **Enterprise & Government:** provides enterprise and government-grade telecommunication services to large businesses and government customers. Examples include the following services: connectivity, mobile, voice, managed network, security, and cloud services. In addition, Symbio provides quick and easy access to cloud-based enterprise infrastructure from partners such as Microsoft, Cisco, and Twilio.
- **Wholesale:** provides white label and wholesale capabilities to offer services (connectivity and voice) to large white label partners across all sectors (e.g., energy, retail, financial) and managed service providers (MSP) with exceptional network and customer service.

Aussie Broadband supply chains

Aussie Broadband's supply chain relationships include suppliers from the following key sectors:

1. Information, communications, and technology, including:
 - a. Voice termination and NBN services
 - b. Mobile and MVNO products
 - c. Network infrastructure (including interconnection, colocation, ethernet access, backhaul, dark fibre, and transmission services)
 - d. IT hardware (including switches, routers, laptops)
2. Facilities Management and Corporate Services:
 - a. Office facilities and utilities
 - b. Cleaning and waste management
 - c. Security services
 - d. Office supplies and corporate clothing
 - e. Travel and hospitality services
3. Professional and Outsourced Services:
 - a. Software engineering and technical support
 - b. Corporate and professional services (including banking, insurance, financial, taxation, and legal advisory)
4. Marketing and Promotional Services:
 - a. Marketing services and merchandise
 - b. Printing and promotional goods

Aussie Broadband is committed to conducting business responsibly and ethically, guided by values that prioritise respect for human rights and sustainable practices. We actively seek to partner with suppliers who share these principles, ensuring that our supply chain reflects integrity and transparency. As a purchaser of goods and services, we recognise that the conduct and performance of our suppliers directly influence our reputation and our ability to serve our communities.

Aussie Broadband's risks of modern slavery practices in the operations and supply chains

Aussie Broadband strives to identify, assess, and mitigate risks of modern slavery within our operations and supply chains. This includes embedding clear expectations in our procurement processes, promoting ethical labour practices, and maintaining zero tolerance for any form of exploitation. By fostering collaborative relationships with like-minded suppliers, we aim to uphold high standards of accountability and contribute to the global effort to eradicate modern slavery. We generally consider our operations and supply chains to have a low risk of modern slavery, with the following risks noted:

1. Technology and Hardware:
 - a. Electronics and networking equipment (routers, switches, laptops, phones) often manufactured in higher-risk countries, particularly in Asia.
 - b. Challenges in supply chain transparency due to complex manufacturing processes.
 - c. Hardware components and raw materials (including fibre) sourced from regions with elevated modern slavery risks.
2. Outsourced Services:
 - a. Service providers operating in regions ranked in the middle to high-risk range for modern slavery, including parts of South East Asia and the Indian subcontinent.
 - b. Providers in countries such as Malaysia, India, Vietnam, and the Philippines.
 - c. Facilities management services, especially cleaning services, which are recognized as high-risk due to the nature of work and employment arrangements.
3. Office Supplies and Marketing Merchandise:
 - a. Paper products and office supplies, though consumption has decreased due to hybrid working arrangements.
 - b. Marketing merchandise, particularly textiles, which carry inherent modern slavery risks in their production.

The potential for the Group to cause or contribute to modern slavery risks through its direct employment practices is considered to be an area of low risk.

Aussie Broadband's risk management and compliance management frameworks include and consider modern slavery risks across the entire Group. Any identified risk in our supply chains will be investigated and monitored.

Aussie Broadband's actions against modern slavery

- Aussie Broadband conducts an initial review of all new suppliers during the onboarding process, as well as ongoing reviews of our supply chain to understand what exposure we have to modern slavery and human trafficking risks through these channels.
- We apply strong governance through our Risk and Compliance Management Frameworks. Built on ISO 37301:2021 and ISO 31000:2018 principles, these frameworks help us identify and mitigate risks in our operations and supply chains, ensuring transparency and respect for human rights.
- Due diligence activities include:
 - Modern slavery risk assessments of our suppliers and reviews of their modern slavery statements where available, including interviews of suppliers as required.
 - Completion of the modern slavery self-assessment questionnaire
 - Verification of compliance with industry standards and accreditations via the supplier sustainability platform [Givable.com](https://www.givable.com)
- Aussie Broadband's internal audit team completes independent assessments as required and seeks confirmation and evidence from suppliers.
- Where appropriate, we inform and educate areas for improvement and opportunities with our vendors and their supply chain. This approach allows us to remedy any issues before they become material.
- Where an issue cannot be remedied or resolved, Aussie Broadband may exercise its right to terminate the contract/ engagement.

Identification, analysis, and evaluation of modern slavery risks

Aussie Broadband has implemented a Modern slavery specific risk assessment process to monitor its vendors. The risk assessment is aligned with the Guidance for Reporting Entities provided in the *Modern Slavery Act 2018* (Cth), considering:

- Sector and industry risks
- Product and services risk
- Geographic risks
- Entity risks

A risk rating is applied for each key risk indicator, obtaining an overall score with dedicated action to implement to mitigate the risk. As part of the due diligence, entities with a high risk must complete a self-assessment questionnaire regarding modern slavery. Aussie Broadband reviews the completed questionnaire and, if applicable, the entity's modern slavery statement.

If concerns are raised, we engage directly with the supplier to obtain the requisite data to decide on the next steps which may include but are not limited to:

- Undertaking an audit, including of the supplier's own supply chain in line with clauses contained in the contract. This may result in defined actions/ remedies to address by the supplier or a particular entity in their supply chain.
- Undertaking an education campaign with the suppliers to increase transparency and knowledge of modern slavery risks.
- Terminating the contract.

Aussie Broadband has internal positions, including a Community Impact team who focus on environmental awareness, ethical conduct, modern slavery and human rights.

Vetting new suppliers

During this reporting period, we have continued to evaluate high risk new suppliers in line with our onboarding process. Relevant new (or renewed) supplier contracts include a contractual commitment from suppliers which requires a supplier to ensure that they inform us of any material modern slavery risks in the supply of the services to Aussie Broadband and provide information to allow Aussie Broadband to comply with its obligations under relevant laws.

Co-operating with our customers to communicate our actions against modern slavery

We respond to requests to complete supplier surveys at the request of our customers, to support their assessment of modern slavery risks and compliance obligations. This reinforces our monitoring and assessment practices on an ongoing basis.

Our people

At Aussie, we conduct regular assurance reviews of our people and payroll systems. These reviews ensure compliance with awards, individual contracts, and workplace conditions.

Aussie Broadband’s purpose is to deliver returns to shareholders while having an overall positive impact on society and the environment

In FY25, through the Pledge 1% global movement, we donated up to 1% of EBITDA via staff volunteering, direct donations, and product discounts. Staff contributed 1,874 volunteer hours across 241 days to causes including animal welfare, environmental conservation, and community care. Our Helping Communities Connect program continued to grow and provided discounted services and digital empowerment advice to 1,158 community partners, representing \$681,855 in donated services. In addition, customers continued to support Small Change Big Change, raising \$148,913. These funds supported 16,645 young Australians through programs that promote mental health, identity, and resilience. Since launch, the initiative has raised \$802,866, with 100% of all funds directed to Reach Out, Red Dust, and Beacon Foundation.

The 3 pillars of our ESG framework are: empowered people and communities, resilient operations and supply chains, and secure and transparent systems. These initiatives focus on our continual improvement and provide a framework to support our B Corp commitments.

Materiality

To help inform our considered and transparent approach to ESG disclosure, a materiality assessment was conducted to focus attention and resources on the material topics that are of highest importance to our customers, staff, regulators, suppliers, communities, and shareholders.

Training

Aussie Broadband delivers modern slavery awareness training for employees with a delegation of authority to enter contracts. The training has a performance monitoring measure implemented to assess its effectiveness. In November 2025, 97.9% of eligible employees completed the training.

Incident reporting and remediation

In FY25, no incidents related to modern slavery were reported.

Internal audit

This ongoing process aligns with our dedication to continuous improvement and ensuring our efforts to eradicate modern slavery remain robust and impactful. We remain committed to transparency and will regularly assess and update our procedures to meet high standards in the fight against modern slavery.

In FY25, there were no material internal audit findings in relation to modern slavery or human rights.

Consultation with the entities we own or control

Aussie Broadband has ensured that all entities within the Group are aware of the requirements of the *Modern Slavery Act 2018*, providing relevant resources to promote a consistent and collaborative approach as outlined in this Statement. In preparing this Statement, our executive team consulted with the entities we own or control, as defined under the Act, to ensure alignment and shared understanding.

In FY25, in collaboration with Telco Together Foundation, Edge Impact and fellow telcos, we proudly launched the "Pathway to Respecting Human Rights and Addressing Modern Slavery Risks Handbook". It shares practical and actionable steps telco organisations, and importantly, our suppliers, can take to identify key strengths and opportunities to help reduce the risk of modern slavery within our operations and supply chains. The Handbook outlines obligations relevant to organisation size, shares key resources, checklists and spotlights current industry action in practice.

Aussie Broadband is engaged with industry working groups to create Industry guidelines to help understand what human rights and modern slavery really mean and how they connect to our business and committing to take action together with our suppliers.

Grievance, confidential reporting and feedback mechanisms

Aussie Broadband has a dedicated whistleblower framework. This framework includes a whistleblower policy, associated training, and an independent third-party provider that allows employees and contractors to raise any issues or concerns confidentially. Our feedback and complaint reporting process can also be used to report any problems or queries. Where grievances or concerns are raised, we will address and investigate the matter accordingly. This may include direct engagement with customers and other stakeholders.

In these cases, we take steps to explore and understand the issue(s) and take appropriate action, which may involve referring the matter to the relevant authorities (in the case of allegations of modern slavery) or engaging with the customer about areas of concern within our organisation.
