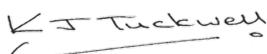

About this Statement

Our Statement

Tetra Tech International Development condemns all forms of human rights abuses, including Modern Slavery practices. We recognise our role in protecting the human rights of all people involved in, or impacted by, our business operations and supply chains. We acknowledge Modern Slavery as a business risk for every industry and seek to take meaningful steps to identify and address those risks by maintaining responsible and transparent supply chains.

Tetra Tech International Development values the *Modern Slavery Act 2018* (Cth) (Act) and the opportunity to provide a Modern Slavery compliance statement (“the Statement”). We understand that, globally, all businesses are likely to be affected by Modern Slavery, either directly or indirectly. Through engaging in honest and collaborative dialogue within and across industry sectors, we can fully understand the exploitation and abuse that characterise Modern Slavery and raise awareness throughout the supply chain.

As prescribed by the Act, our Statement comprises the following:

Reporting entity, period and approval

This Statement is provided by Tetra Tech International Development Pty Ltd (ACN 007 889 081) (“Reporting Entity”) under the Act and is an individual Statement covering the financial year ending June 2025.

This statement was approved by the principal governing body of Tetra Tech International Development on 18 December 2025.

Risk Identification and Assessment

Risk identification

As per Tetra Tech’s Modern Slavery Policy, all programs must complete a modern slavery risk assessment using Tetra Tech’s Modern Slavery Risk Assessment Tool. This must occur within three months of project start-up, then reviewed annually, or in response to major changes in the operating context which may affect the Program’s modern slavery risk. The risk assessment tool enables project staff to determine whether there are any existing or potential modern slavery risks associated with the program’s operations or supply chain.

For this, all programs completed or reviewed a risk assessment of their local operations and supply chain specific to their operative environment/ country/ regional context.

These assessments were then analysed and consolidated to produce the Tetra Tech International Development’s overall operational risk rating.

In order to determine supply chain risk, Tetra Tech International Development evaluated supply chain risks via analysis of results from our Supplier Safeguarding Questionnaires (SSQ) issued to all new suppliers through our supply chain management platform.

Operational and supply chain analysis

For the FY24/25 Statement, Tetra Tech International Development conducted an operational and supply chain risk assessment.

Findings

Policies

Modern Slavery Policy

The prevention of Modern Slavery practices remains a core risk area for Tetra Tech International Development and is considered a priority in our safeguarding framework. Tetra Tech International Development policies related to Modern Slavery are in the table below:

Tetra Tech International Development’s Modern Slavery Policy was updated in FY24/25 following review and internal stakeholder consultation. In the updated policy (version 2), we:

- » state a zero-tolerance approach to Modern Slavery
- » commit to conducting modern slavery due diligence in alignment with the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights to mitigate the risk of modern slavery practices in our business operations and supply chains
- » set out how we proactively identify modern slavery risks through risk assessments and supplier screening tools
- » prohibit behaviour that leads to Modern Slavery or a breach of Modern Slavery laws

- » require all tender documents and downstream and partnering agreements to contain certain modern slavery clauses
- » set out annual mandatory training, policy review and Modern Slavery reporting requirements.

In addition to mitigating against modern slavery risks in our operations, Tetra Tech International Development’s Modern Slavery Policy is available for our suppliers to adapt and implement where they do not have an existing policy which addresses modern slavery.

Supplier Screening Policy

Tetra Tech International Development’s Supplier Screening Policy and its associated Procedure were updated in FY24/25, following a review of the previous version, the Supplier Screening and Due Diligence Procedure. This Policy requires that prior to any contractual engagement being entered into, all Suppliers must be screened, unless an exception is granted by the Head of Legal, Risk and Compliance. The screening involves checking all suppliers against relevant Australian and international sanctions lists. Furthermore, all suppliers (excluding sole traders and individuals) who meet certain risk-based criteria must be screened by way of Safeguard Screening Questionnaire (SSQ), with respect to their capacity to manage risks across the following areas of safeguarding:

- » Sexual Exploitation, Abuse, and Harassment (SEAH)
- » Child Protection
- » Modern Slavery
- » Fraud and Corruption
- » Environmental Protection

Suppliers which meet one or more of the following risk-based criteria must be screened with an SSQ:

- » **Direct Beneficiary Contact**, meaning Suppliers who will have direct interaction with the following individuals or groups of people as part of their delivery of services:
 - Program beneficiaries and/or recipients
 - Vulnerable individuals or communities
 - Government officials or partners

» **High-risk Goods and Services**, meaning Suppliers providing goods or services considered high-risk for:

- Human rights abuses
- Corruption
- Environmental degradation

Annex 2 of the Policy provides a list of the industries/services and goods Tetra Tech considers high-risk and is subject to change.

» **Contract Value Threshold**, meaning Suppliers with a total annual contract value exceeding AUD 10,000.

The Supplier Screening Procedure outlines the process for screening suppliers, including for remediating results and ongoing supplier engagement.

Child Protection Policy

Tetra Tech International Development's Child Protection Policy mitigates the risk of forced or other hazardous forms of child labour in our operations and supply chains, by imposing certain standards of conduct with respect to not engaging children for domestic or other labour (see 'Safeguarding Code of Conduct' below for more details on this), requiring personnel to report child protection issues, and for complying with relevant legislation with respect to labour laws and child labour. This Policy also requires personnel to conduct child protection risk assessments for prospective programs, workstreams and activities, which must assess risk of child labour, including the risk of children in hazardous work.

Prevention of Sexual Exploitation, Abuse or Harassment (PSEAH) Policy and Procedure

Tetra Tech International Development's PSEAH Policy mitigates the risk of sexual exploitation and similar forms of modern slavery in our operations and supply chains, by including imposing certain standards of conduct with respect to PSEAH, including prohibiting transactional sex and requiring personnel to report SEAH issues. The Policy also requires personnel to conduct PSEAH risk assessments for prospective programs, workstreams and activities.

Safeguarding Code of Conduct

Tetra Tech International Development's Safeguarding Code of Conduct was launched in FY24/25. This Code forms part of the contract that any personnel (including third parties) enters into with Tetra Tech and complements existing policies and procedures relating to child protection, preventing sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment and modern slavery. As an overview, some of the requirements in the Code with respect to modern slavery include the following:

- » personnel must adhere to reporting requirements and timeframes for reporting modern slavery practices and/or incidents in our operations and supply chains
- » employees are provided with at least the minimum level of wages and other entitlements in compliance with relevant labour laws and applicable industrial instruments
- » employees do not pay or otherwise incur debts in relation to recruitment (or similar fees)
- » employees maintain exclusive possession of their travel and/or identity documents
- » employees can exercise rights to freedom of association, collective bargaining and the right to form and join trade unions
- » employees have access to an effective and safe grievance mechanism
- » personnel must not engage in modern slavery or use modern slavery practices in their operations or supply chains, including:
 - causing another person to enter into or remain in forced labour
 - engaging in or arranging a marriage of a person under 18 years old
 - employing children below the minimum legal working age according to local labour laws, or employing a child (under 18) to engage in hazardous work, or for domestic or other labour, which is inappropriate given their age or developmental stage, which interferes with their time available for education and recreational activities, or which places them at significant risk of injury.

Diversity and Inclusion Policy & Equal Employment Opportunity and Discrimination Free Workplace Policy

Tetra Tech International Development's Diversity and Inclusion Policy and Equal Employment Opportunity and Discrimination Free Workplace Policy mitigate the risk of modern slavery in our operations, by ensuring all staff enjoy the same working rights, standards and conditions, regardless of migrant status.

Complaint and Dispute Resolution Policy and Whistleblower Policy

Tetra Tech International Development's Complaint and Dispute Resolution and Whistleblower Policies ensure pathways are available for employees to seek assistance for a range of complaints or concerns, including for labour rights violations and/or exploitation.

Training and education

Tetra Tech International Development's Modern Slavery Policy (version 2) established a requirement for annual mandatory modern slavery training for all Tetra Tech International Development employees. A Modern Slavery Awareness training module was launched in FY24/25, delivered by the Environment, Social and Governance (ESG) Manager to all Tetra Tech International Development employees. Two sessions were delivered to corporate staff (who were required to attend one) and sessions were delivered to program teams over the course of the year, as new programs commenced. The Modern Slavery Awareness Training module covers:

- » modern slavery definitions,
- » key prevalence and estimates statistics,
- » drivers and key indicators of modern slavery,
- » modern slavery regulation in Australia, including the *Modern Slavery Act 2018* (Cth),
- » Tetra Tech's Modern Slavery Policy,
- » making modern slavery reports,
- » The Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade's Environmental and Social Safeguard Policy, and
- » further resources and support

An online version of this training module will be launched in FY25/26 to use as an annual refresher for all staff and can be made available to contractors and other third parties on a case-by-case basis. Tetra Tech

International Development's ESG Manager will continue to develop and deliver bespoke modern slavery risk management training for specific and/or new projects, upon request.

In addition to modern slavery-specific training, two training sessions were also delivered in November 2024 to upskill and refresh staff (particularly those involved in purchasing, procurement and supplier engagement) on the requirements and procedures for supplier screening in alignment with the Supplier Screening Policy.

Tender and Contract Clauses

In accordance with Tetra Tech's Modern Slavery Policy, modern slavery risks must be considered as part of tender development, in order to inform the inclusion and evaluation of modern slavery questions in the tender process. Additionally, all tender documents must include specific modern slavery-related questions, including that the Tenderer must agree that its pricing or compensation structure will enable the contract to be performed without causing or contributing to modern slavery.

All downstream and partnering agreements must contain specific modern slavery clauses. Such clauses have the effect of requiring the other party/ies to:

- » assess modern slavery risks
- » report any suspected or actual modern slavery incidents and remedial actions
- » ensure employees do not pay recruitment (or similar) fees in relation to their employment
- » ensure employees possess, or have access to, their travel and identity documents at all times, and
- » include similar clauses in their own contracts with their suppliers.

Ongoing supplier due diligence

As the primary source of Modern Slavery risk lies within our supply chain, particularly the increased risk at Tier 2 and beyond suppliers, our supplier due diligence procedures and system remain a critical mechanism through which we reduce risk. We continue to integrate Modern Slavery questions into our Supplier Safeguard Questionnaire (SSQ) to assess the capability of our suppliers in managing downstream risks.

The SSQ is designed to understand our supplier's risk controls and capability for managing Modern Slavery risks, including:

- » policies and procedures
- » risk assessment capacity
- » staff training
- » risk and incident reporting.

Following review and assessment of the SSQs, we mitigate risk in our supply chains through supplier engagement by:

- » re-assessing criticality to our supply chain and whether an alternate and lower risk supplier may be engaged
- » capacity strengthening suppliers to effectively modify their exposure and/or control measures to reduce their level of risk
- » monitor their performance to ensure risks are appropriately controlled.

Recognising the emerging connection between Modern Slavery and terrorism, the due diligence framework also requires thorough vetting of all downstream partners against common international sanctions lists such as the World Bank Listing of Ineligible Firms and Individuals. This critical process serves to prevent the diversion of funds to entities involved in terrorism or Modern Slavery practices, aligning with our commitment to ethical practices

After a third party is engaged, Tetra Tech is committed to ongoing engagement with the party throughout the duration of the contract, with the aim of fostering positive and collaborative relationships and to incentivise good safeguarding practices. Ongoing supplier engagement and monitoring aims to ensure that:

- » suppliers understand their obligations under their signed contract,
- » suppliers are implementing any risk treatment / mitigation measures that were put in place, focusing on the supports that can be offered to build the supplier's capability in managing their risks and impacts, rather than penalising the supplier for failing to do so, and
- » suppliers are incentivised to work with Tetra Tech to address their safeguarding risks and incidents, through fostering positive relationships with suppliers that are based on collaboration, transparency and good communication.

Assessing effectiveness

For FY24/25, Tetra Tech International Development sought to assess the effectiveness of our actions by tracking certain information/data. The results are as follows:
