

Modern Slavery Assessment Statement



Our Commitment

Construction Control Australia Pty Limited are committed to treating all workers with respect and dignity, ensuring safe working conditions, delivering high quality projects, and conducting environmentally responsible and ethical operations.

Construction Control is committed to ending all forms of modern slavery and reduce the risk of modern slavery practices within our supply chains and operations.

As a part of our overall commitment to supporting human rights around the world, we stand against all forms of modern slavery, and work to ensure it does not find a foothold in our supply chains and business operations.

Modern slavery is defined by the Modern Slavery Act (Cth) 2018 to include eight types of serious exploitation and which can be understood as:

- trafficking in persons, which is the recruitment, harbouring and movement of a
 person for the purposes of exploitation through modern slavery. Exploitation also
 includes the prostitution of others or other forms of sexual exploitation, forced labour
 or services, slavery or practices similar to slavery, servitude or the removal of organs;
- **slavery**, which is where the offender exercises powers of ownership over the victim;
- servitude which is where the victim's personal freedom is significantly restricted and they are not free to stop working or leave their place of work;
- forced labour, which is where the victim is either not free to stop working or not free to leave their place of work;
- forced marriage, which is where coercion, threats or deception are used to make a
 victim marry or where the victim does not understand or is incapable of understanding
 the nature and effect of the marriage ceremony;
- **debt bondage**, which is where the victim's services are pledged as security for a debt and the debt is manifestly excessive or the victim's services are not applied to liquidate the debt, or the length and nature of the services are not limited and defined;
- the worst forms of child labour, which involves situations where children are: exploited through slavery or similar practices, including for sexual exploitation; or engaged in hazardous work which may harm their health or safety, or used to produce or traffic drugs; and
- deceptive recruiting for labour or services which is where the victim is deceived about whether they will be exploited through a type of modern slavery

It can also extend to:

- entering into a commercial transaction involving a slave;
- exercising control or direction over, or providing finance for, any commercial transaction involving a slave or act of slave trading;
- conducting a business involving servitude or forced labour (including exercising control over the business or providing finance to it);

Construction Control's approach to limiting the risk of modern slavery practices are as follows:

Operations

Our contractual terms reflect Subcontractor obligations, including compliance with Australian modern slavery laws and those foreign modern slavery laws that apply in the location(s) in which they operate.

Supply Chain mapping and risk assessment

We encourage our suppliers to complete a Corporate Social Responsibility questionnaire which contains questions relevant to modern slavery. This will provide us with a greater understanding of the risk of modern slavery within a supplier's supply chains or operations and enable us to work with a supplier to reduce the risks identified. We will actively and progressively improve our understanding and oversight of all tiers of our supply chains.

Communications, Engagement and Training

Construction Control Employees will be provided communications and training opportunities to enhance their understanding of the causes and humanitarian impact of modern slavery, the Modern Slavery Policy and our approach to limiting the risk of modern slavery within our supply chains, subcontractor management and project operations.

Continuous improvement approach to reduce the risk of modern slavery

Construction Control is committed to apply a continuous improvement approach to how we reduce the risk of modern slavery practices within our supply chains, subcontractor management and project operations. We will seek feedback from our employees, subcontractors, clients and other stakeholders in regard to the success or otherwise of the actions we have taken to reduce the risk of modern slavery.

Operations

Commencing in 1988 Construction Control is a construction and project management firm delivering projects in the ACT, NSW, and QLD.

The firm started doing small fit-outs and refurbishments and quickly built a reputation for quality of outcome, and client, staff and partners satisfaction. The focus has always been on careful consideration and planning on all projects, and the forming of close, strategic collaborations with clients, consultants and contractors. We have consistently proven that complexity is only a challenge to be overcome. Our team thrives on solving complex problems in construction. We have delivered the improbable for our clients, within budget and to program.

Construction Control remains 100% Australian owned and operated, employing construction professionals who are the best and brightest in the game.

Supply Chain Mapping

Construction Control conduct its operations in consultation and partnership with top tier subcontractors and suppliers.

Construction Control had over 1,873,471 manhours engaged on its construction projects during the financial year 2019/20 reporting period. On an average work month across Construction Control's 11 active projects we had 140 direct employees and approximately 2,000 subcontractors and/or suppliers.

Construction Control engages with Australian based subcontractors and suppliers, many of whom source the materials from overseas sources, namely Italy, China, America, Austria, and across various EU Nations.

Construction Control continually assesses modern slavery risk in our supply chains. Our assessment processes involved review and analysis of the data to identify higher-risk areas of our business based on external reports and standards, country and sector risk profiles, and input from experts in this area.

In addition, to assess supplier-specific risk, we considered the industry, work type, geography, and supplier reputation, among other factors.



Risk Assessment & Reporting

This is Construction Control's first Modern Slavery Statement and we have used this reporting period as an opportunity to better understand modern slavery and educate our workers, subcontractors, and suppliers on practices to prevent and minimise modern slavery.

Steps taken in this period had been developed and implemented:

- Prevention of Modern Slavery Policy Statement
- Prevention of Modern Slavery Procedure
- Supply Chain Risk Assessment conducted

Modern Slavery criteria and clauses have also been included in our tenders, contracts and tender interviews which challenges our suppliers to ensure the prevention and elimination of modern slavery.

A Modern Slavery Questionnaire had was conducted with our key suppliers. As part of the assessment process, suppliers completed a self-assessment questionnaire about their working conditions, their supply chain details, their policies and management systems. The process also included supplier background checks, examination of labor-related issues that appear in publicly available databases.

Construction Control has used the initial Modern Slavery Statement reporting period to focus on learning more about modern slavery and developing policies and procedures for the future. We used the first supplier questionnaire as an opportunity to develop and refine our process.

Communication, Engagement & Training

Construction Control is committed to ensuring transparency in our business and approach to tackling modern slavery risks throughout our supply chains. We expect the same high standards from our suppliers, and we include specific measures in our tenders and contracts with suppliers against the use of forced, compulsory or trafficked labor, or anyone held in slavery or servitude, whether adults or children.

Training on the risks Construction Control face regarding modern slavery practices in our business operations and supply chains is provided to our staff and suppliers.

Construction Controls encourages their staff and suppliers to raise concerns or suspicion of modern slavery in any parts of our business, our supply chains, or the supply chains of our suppliers.



Continuous Improvement

Modern slavery is a serious crime and a violation of fundamental human rights. Construction Control believes that its modern slavery risk mitigation practices reflect its goals of acting ethically in the marketplace, with integrity to all workers, and with transparency to all stakeholders.

Our modern slavery risk mitigation practices also make good business sense and are consistent with our public disclosure obligations under the Modern Slavery Act (Cth) 2018 in Australia and other applicable laws.

Construction Control seeks to continually improve its policies, procedures, education, questionnaire process and risk management practices regarding this important issue.

Construction Control is committed to the following actions during the next reporting period:

- Undertake a detailed risk assessment of our operations and supply chain
- Review results and agree to a plan to monitor and mitigate key risks
- Implement further due diligence by screening and interviewing our subcontractor companies at time of tender on modern slavery risk and compliance
- Further educate our internal Modern Slavery training program to all staff

Managing the risk and assessing the effectiveness of these actions require ongoing commitment and collaboration with our suppliers and the industry. To manage this, an internal working group will continue to engage and meet on a quarterly basis to discuss the control measures required to mitigate the risk. Recommendations will be provided to the Senior Management team for consideration and implementation.

During the period, Construction Control has engaged with an external support provider 'Centrl' to ensure the company's commitment and obligations are compliant to the Modern Slavery Act (Cth) 2018 in Australia and other applicable laws

This statement for the 2019/20 financial year is made pursuant to section 14 of the Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Australian Government).
