#### 1. Identify the reporting entity

Australian Lamb Company Pty Ltd (ALC) is committed to ethical manufacturing and ensuring working conditions within our operations and supply chains are fair, equitable, and safe.

ALC has prepared this Modern Slavery Statement ('the statement') in accordance with the Commonwealth's Modern Slavery Act 2018 for the financial year ending 2022.

As required by Section 16 of the legislation, this statement outlines the steps taken by ALC to identify and minimise the risk of modern slavery occurring in our business, including our supply chain. ALC is committed to the continuous improvement of its response to modern slavery and will continue to build on what is set out in this statement.

## 2. Structure, operations and supply chains

ALC operates Australia's single largest small-stock processing site in Australia. We are a 100% Australian privately owned company that is recognised globally as a processor and marketer of premium lamb.

We process up to 75,000 head per week, producing premium lamb and lamb products that are distributed to domestic and internal markets. We export to over 70 countries worldwide.

Employing over 800 people, we operate across 2 sites in Victoria, Australia:

- 1 abattoir and processing facility in Colac
- 1 processing facility in Sunshine.

We source our livestock from high quality and reputable producers in Southern Australia.

# 3. Risks of modern slavery in operations and supply chains

ALC has reviewed the risks of modern slavery in our operations and supply chains, and have identified the greatest risks to modern slavery are linked to:

- Reliance on a migrant workforce with limited English language competency and temporary visa arrangements.
- Suppliers and subcontractors. Types of modern slavery risks include exploited labour.

ALC is committed to continuously improving our risk identification capability to ensure that modern slavery does not exist within our operations or supply chain.

## 4. Actions taken to assess and address those risks

As a first step, ALC is addressing modern slavery risks through a number of policies to ensure a safe work environment, including our:

- Ethical Sourcing and Modern Slavery Policy
- Human Rights Policy
- Workplace diversity and Equality Policy
- Recruitment Policy
- Whistle Blower Policy.

In particular, our Ethical Sourcing and Modern Slavery Policy requires suppliers to comply with ALC's expectations and legislation with regards to child, forced or illegal labour, and health and safety. We reserve the right to terminate any contract or agreement in the event of noncompliance. We will continue to review and revise our training, policies and supplier processes to ensure we are managing risks of modern slavery effectively.

## 5. Assessing the effectiveness of actions taken

We will continue to establish processes to assess the effectiveness of actions taken to reduce the risk of modern slavery in our operations and supply chain.

We will measure effectiveness by:

- Conducting a review of our Modern Slavery Statement and our internal policies
- Communicating with our supply chain to ensure their understanding of, and promote compliance with, our expectations
- Implement plans to monitor key risks with our suppliers
- Establish regular reporting to our Board and Executives.

Additionally, we will further assess risks in cooperation with our suppliers to strengthen our response to modern slavery.

#### 6. Consultation

We will develop and implement consultation mechanisms to:

- Engage our employees and management in issues of modern slavery
- Work with our suppliers to better identify risks and establish measurement and reporting mechanisms.
