



JLG Australia Modern Slavery Act Statement – FY25

REPORTING ENTITY

This statement is made in accordance with Section 13 of the Modern Slavery Act 2018 and sets out the steps that JLG Australia Pty Limited (ABN 29 663 368 938) has taken and continues to take to prevent modern slavery and human trafficking in its business and supply chains.

The reporting entity JLG Australia Pty Limited (ABN 29 663 368 938), is a member of the Oshkosh Corporation, (referred to here as "Oshkosh") is a global company that manufactures and markets access equipment, specialty vehicles and truck bodies for the primary markets of defence, concrete placement, refuse hauling, access equipment and fire & emergency. Oshkosh has a zero-tolerance approach towards any form of modern slavery, human trafficking, forced labour and child labour and requires that all of its subsidiaries' employees, officers, and directors and any third party acting on behalf of the company comply fully with applicable human trafficking laws and regulations.

JLG Australia is working to fulfill its commitment to protect human rights by developing processes that can identify and prevent human rights risks both internally and throughout our value chain. We are also dedicated to implementing appropriate remediation when adverse impacts are identified within our own business activities or through our third parties or business partners.

RISKS OF MODERN SLAVERY PRACTICE IN SUPPLY CHAIN AND OPERATION

JLG Australia Pty Limited does not own or control any other entities, so no additional risks related to the controlled entities are disclosed herein. As a subsidiary of Oshkosh Corporation, a global corporation with worldwide supply chain operation, JLG Australia leverages the group's risk framework while assessing risk to our local operation and supply chain.

We acknowledge the risks and challenge the suppliers may face exposure to modern slavery risk, in the potential forms of inadequate wages or working protections for their employees, or contractors, particular in jurisdictions with weaker labour regulation oversight. We also acknowledge these risks may arise from a lack of awareness of the modern slavery issues, insufficient control process to identify and mitigate modern slavery concerns.

In our day-to-day operation, which include manufacture, sale, service of various equipment and special vehicles, we acknowledge a company in our size may be exposed to risks including potential excessive working hours, unsafe working conditions for our working forces.



ACTIONS TAKEN TO MONITOR, ASSESS AND ADDRESS RISK

● TEAM MEMBER AWARENESS CONSULTATION AND REPORTING

All Oshkosh team members are trained annually on The Oshkosh Way including how to report violations. Team members are not expected to always know what to do in every situation, however they have a duty to seek help if something is unclear or causes concern.

In addition to The Oshkosh Way, we provide annual awareness/refresher training on the following topics;

- Slavery and Human Trafficking in Supply Chains
- Human Trafficking and Coercion Prevention

This training is automatically scheduled to selected employees and completion is monitored/managed by branch location to ensure this is completed.

Oshkosh expects team members to speak up if they see or suspect conduct that creates the risk of a legal or ethical violation and will continue to develop training for purchasing teams to identify and report ethical concerns or issues.

● SUPPLY CHAIN

Oshkosh expects all suppliers to have a clear understanding of our requirements and to embrace with them in business practice. All suppliers are expected to read and comply with the principles in the Supplier Code of Conduct and The Oshkosh Way as a condition of doing business with our Company.

Oshkosh adopts a group wide contractor management system that requires suppliers and contractors to provide evidence of their requirements to meet Modern Slavery Act 2018.

● MEASURING RISKS OF MODERN SLAVERY IN OUR OPERATIONS AND SUPPLY CHAIN

Oshkosh group is committed to our zero-tolerance policy towards Modern Slavery and assesses the risks in our business our supply chain using our supply chain technology called FRDM and the Australian Modern Slavery Act (2018).

Using a risk based approach, our company has identified areas where our business and/or supply chains may be vulnerable to modern slavery. We utilise FRDM to dig into the lower tiers of our supply chain where those risks may reside. All our suppliers must complete the Modern Slavery pre-qualification and be approved on our operating system.

● MONITORING

Our company's group level purchasing organization is responsible for supporting and evaluating suppliers and may engage in monitoring activities to assess compliance with the Supplier Code of Conduct including onsite inspection of facilities.

Contractors and suppliers are required to complete an annual review of their Modern Slavery Ethical Sourcing either through a detailed review or via survey to achieve compliance with Oshkosh.



The company reserves the right to carry out inspections of suppliers either by internal staff or by a third party chosen by the Company.

- **RISK ASSESSMENT**

Oshkosh assesses the risks of human trafficking in our Australian business and supply chain using FRDM and the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 and any reports compiled by the Australian Government.

This Statement constitutes Oshkosh's statement for the financial year ending 31 December 2025.

CONSULTATION PROCESS

JLG Australia Pty Limited does not own or control any other entity, and is not covered by a joint modern slavery statement issued by any other entity under Section 14 of the Modern Slavery Act 2018.

Accordingly, there is no consultation process to disclose under section 16(1)(f) of the Modern Slavery Act 2018.

The following items will be completed prior to our next reporting period in FY26:

Continue with Staff Training

All staff refresher training will be completed annually, the refresher training will include the following topics;

- Overview of suppliers in the system, high risk suppliers and corrective actions implemented
- Slavery and Human Trafficking in Supply Chains
- Human Trafficking and Coercion Prevention

This training is automatically scheduled to selected employees and completion is monitored/managed to ensure this is completed.

The training will enable JLG Australia to capture any changes to legislation and or Industry best practice.

Oshkosh is committed to eliminating modern slavery in all its forms, and to continuously improve strategies to identify and mitigate modern slavery and ethical sourcing risks.

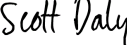
We are pleased to publish this 2025 Modern Slavery Statement and commit to continuing to track and publicly report on our progress.
