3. Supply Chains

Saunders has over 800 direct domestic and international suppliers who support the delivery of our services. Our supply chain can be broadly split into two primary categories – "Subcontracted works" and "Goods and Services Supply".

Subcontracted works refer to the engagement of a subcontractor to deliver a scope of work that includes the supply of the materials, goods and services required to fully deliver the subcontracted scope, e.g., the engagement of a civil contractor to provide a building foundation. The subcontracted works may include elements of both onsite and off-site labour and engagement of goods and services providers with whom we have no direct relationship. Subcontracted works constitute the largest segment of our supply chain and account for approximately 53% of our supply chain spend. Our key areas of expenditure for subcontracted works relate to the following categories:

- Fabricated industrial goods such as piping and valves.
- Subcontracted site works such as civil, electrical and protective coatings contractors.
- Environmental services, including waste management and environmental monitoring.
- Professional services such as engineering, legal and financial services.

Goods and Services Supply involve the procurement of goods and services by Saunders on a supply-only basis, i.e., the goods and services are incorporated directly into the works being undertaken by Saunders, e.g., concrete supply incorporated into bund wall construction. Goods and Services supply typically accounts for 47% of our supply chain spend.

Our key areas of expenditure for goods and services supply relate to the following categories:

- Raw materials such as plate and reinforcement steel and concrete.
- Fabricated industrial goods such as piping and valves.
- Construction consumables such as fuel, welding rods, and personal protective equipment.
- Plant and equipment such as cranes, diesel generators and welding machines.
- Labour hire.
- Insurance providers.

While our supply chain is primarily in service of the management, design, construction, and maintenance of projects related to our core operations outlined previously, it also includes goods and services related to corporate operations. Corporate services represent 5% of our supply chain spend, with our key areas of expenditure including:

- Property services such as office leasing, utilities, and maintenance services.
- Information and communication technology.
- Professional services such as financial auditing.
- Branded merchandise and attire (including safety attire).
- Hospitality and catering.

Saunders procures the vast majority of our subcontracted services and goods and services supply from providers within Australia. Saunders does have operations in or procure from organisations based in any of the 10 high-risk countries identified in the 2018 Global Slavery Index.



4. Modern Slavery Risks

Saunders has identified the following risk factors for consideration in the context of supply chain and supply chain management:

Sector & Industry risks – Certain sectors and industries within our supply chain will have a greater risk of modern slavery practices due to the industry structure and culture. For example, industries where there is a reliance on a low-skilled transient workforce due to seasonal variations in workforce requirements.

Geographic risks – Certain countries from which goods and services may be supplied will have a higher risk of modern slavery due to poor governance, conflict and socio-economic factors such as low employment. For example, the supply of goods manufactured in countries that have not enforced the International Labour Conventions relevant to Modern Slavery. **Entity risks** – Certain entities from which the supply of goods and services and subcontracted works are procured will have a greater risk of modern slavery practices due to poor governance structures and organisational culture. For example, entities that are non-compliant with accepted human rights and labour standards.

Each of the aforementioned risk factors is considered in the development and implementation of our procurement methodology and supply chain management strategy to ensure we minimise the risks that we cause, contribute to, or may be directly linked to modern slavery practices.





5. Addressing the Risks of Modern Slavery

Saunders considers the risk of modern slavery in its immediate supply chain to be low due to the geography of its operations and predominately domestic supply chain. However, Saunders recognises the need to address the residual risks of modern slavery and does so in four key areas – governance and leadership, policies and frameworks, training and education and processes and procedures.

Governance and leadership - Saunders' leadership is committed to setting a strong example of ethical behaviour for the organisation. The practices expected by the leadership are enshrined in the polices and frameworks, communicated through training and education, and practised via our processes and procedures. In the last 12 months, the executive team has engaged an external environmental, social and corporate governance (ESG) specialist to perform a gap analysis in the context or ESG (including modern slavery) and develop a strategy for improving our collection and analysis of data relating to our supply chain.

Polices and Frameworks - Saunders utilises several policies to assist in the management of modern slavery risks across the organisation and its related entities, including:

- Code of Business Conduct Promotes ethical behaviour and outlines the standard of behaviour expected of Saunders employees.
- Modern Slavery Policy Sets out how Saunders will conduct business in a manner consistent with the International Bill of Human Rights and the International Labour Organisation Declaration of Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work.
- Health, Safety and Environment Policy Affirms our commitment to zero harm and the ongoing management of the systems and processes that underpin our commitment to minimise health, safety, or environmental impacts arising from our activities and services.

- Whistle-blowing Policy Outlines how we support whistle-blowers if they need to report breaches of the law or suspected improper, unethical, or unlawful conduct relating to the Saunders group of companies.
- Antibribery and Corruption Policy Outlines our commitment to operating in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations and with the highest standards of ethical behaviour at all times.
- Sustainable Procurement policy Requires that procurement activities are conducted transparently and that the effects our procurement decisions have on the environment and society are considered.

In the last 12 months all policies have been reviewed for currency, and if appropriate, updated in our Integrated Management System (IMS).

Training and Education - We have mandatory Code of Conduct training for all employees of Saunders Group businesses, which addresses the identification and management of modern slavery risks. In the last 12 months, the training records were reviewed to ensure all Saunders employees had completed all mandatory training.

Processes and Procedures – Saunders has a procurement framework that includes a subcontractor selection, engagement, monitoring and review procedure (SND-OPS-PRO-002) to ensure subcontractors are evaluated consistently based on their commitment to health, safety, environment, quality and security in the services they are engaged to deliver.

Our framework also features a set of standard subcontract and goods supply contracts that require compliance with applicable laws. In the last 12 months, efforts have been made to centralise procurement activities to ensure better compliance and the procurement framework is in the process of being reviewed and updated to better manage our modern slavery risks.



6.Assessing our Effectiveness

Our assessment of the effectiveness of our actions is conducted through evaluation of our modern slavery residual risks using the Saunders Group Risk management framework and through annual review of compliance with mandatory training requirements and adherence to relevant policies and procedures.

Our risk management framework assigns each risk a risk level (high to low) which is based on the consequence of the event (e.g., catastrophic through to insignificant) and the probability of the event occurring (e.g., repeating occurrence through to practically impossible). Where risks are at a level higher than low, a mitigation strategy is developed using the hierarchy of controls (eliminate through to administrative). Assessment of our modern slavery risks has led to the creation of a number of initiatives over the last 12 months to further reduce our residual risk, including:

- Improved compliance programs for employee training programs to increase the level of awareness and understanding of the potential for modern slavery within our supply chain.
- Establishment of a central procurement hub to ensure consistent monitoring and management of modern slavery risks in our operations.
- Engagement of an ESG consultant to identify areas for improvement in our supply chain management with scope including improvement of modern slavery risk mitigation program.

We are dedicated to the continuous improvement of our assessment and effectiveness of modern slavery risk management and will continue to invest in improving our supply chain monitoring and management tools.



7. Consultation

Saunders makes a joint statement on behalf of its entities as described in Section 2. Through its centralised support function and joint Senior Leadership Team, Saunders has engaged with its entities to identify, assess and address modern slavery risks in the supply chains of its operations.

All entities in the Saunders Group are subject to the policies, procedures and frameworks outlined in this statement.

8. Approval of Statement

The board of Directors of Saunders International, its principal governing body, has unanimously approved this Statement on the 20th of December 2023 and authorised Mark Benson as the responsible executive of Saunders International to sign this statement in accordance with the Act.
