



MODERN SLAVERY STATEMENT

2. Reporting Entities

2.1. This Statement is a joint statement made by the following Australian-incorporated reporting entities (collectively, "Allnex Australia") under the Act:

a) Company Name: Allnex Resins Australia Pty Ltd ("Allnex Resins")

Registration Number: ACN 000 045 572

b) Company Name: Allnex Australia Holding Pty Ltd

Registration Number: ACN 614 712 364

c) Company Name: Allnex Australia Pty Ltd Registration Number: ACN 160 397 768

Following an internal restructure of trading operation in Australia, the trading operations of Allnex Australia Pty Limited (ACN 160 397 768) were transferred to Allnex Resins on 1 October 2022.

- 2.2. The corporate structure of the reporting entities is set out in section 3.1 below.
- 2.3. Allnex Australia is part of the Allnex group ("Allnex Group"), a global company with EUR€2.3 billion revenue per annum and a leading producer of resins and additives. Allnex Resins is the sole operating entity in Australia and all employees are hired by Allnex Resins. Allnex Australia Pty Ltd formerly acted as a distribution entity but its operations were transferred to Allnex Resins in 2022 and it no longer has any employees. Allnex Australia Holding Pty Ltd is a holding company, with no employees. Allnex Resins and other Allnex companies in the Allnex Group's global structure operate under the same policies and share the same commitments as set out in this Statement. More information of our operation can be found in section 3.2.

2.4 Allnex Australia is committed to doing business ethically and responsibly, and continues to strive to consciously improve its implementation of the Act with the ultimate objective of eliminating and preventing any modern slavery risks within its operations and supply chains.



3. Structure, Operations and Supply Chain

3.1. Structure

Allnex Australia is a group of private companies. Its parent company, Allnex Belgium, is managing and overseeing the global operation of the Allnex Group. Nuplex Resins (Vietnam) Pty Ltd ("Nuplex Resins") is controlled by Allnex Resins within the meaning of the Act. Nuplex Resins operates independently in Bien Hoa City, Dong Nai Province, Vietnam, following the same global policies and compliance framework as Allnex Australia. In summary, our corporate structure is as following:



Allnex Resins employs approximately 264 employees, operates in Australia, and is primarily administered from its head office in Botany, New South Wales. The employees are working in the different offices, manufacturing sites, and warehouses.

Allnex Group recognises that its employees are its most valuable asset; they are fundamental to the success of Allnex's business and operations. The diversity of the Allnex Group's workforce (including a diversified demographic profile across all regions and leadership levels, etc.) is an asset, bringing fresh ideas, perspectives and experiences that align with and support Allnex's values and will continue to enhance Allnex's performance and services to its customers. Allnex Group continues to support and promote an equal opportunity employment policy to guide its hiring processes in facilitating diversity.

3.2. Operations

Allnex Group is the leading global industrial coating resins company. It is a specialty chemicals pioneer in green chemistry, offering an extensive range of products including innovative polyesters, alkyd, acrylic, epoxy and urethane polymers which are used as key ingredients for coatings, i.e. resins, crosslinkers and additives. We know our strengths and use them well. Our key technologies and segments are:

Underlying the success of the Allnex Group is a global network of research and development centres and manufacturing facilities. Allnex Group's research teams work in close cooperation with our clients to develop coating solutions which assist our clients to meet some of the most stringent sustainability requirements.


The majority of Allnex Resins' operations are in the liquid resins and additives division. In Australia, Allnex operates at two manufacturing sites located at Wacol, Queensland and Botany, New South Wales, respectively. In June 2023, Allnex Australia announced plans to cease manufacturing at the plant in Botany, New South Wales, by December 2027. It is intended that the finished goods volumes currently produced at the Botany plant will be produced at Allnex Resins' plant in Wacol, Queensland or at other Allnex group plants, from 2028 onwards.

Allnex Resins also has non-production sites which are used for warehousing and distribution, sales and/ or administration. These are located in Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia.

Allnex Resins' business model involves sales direct to our customer base, with most of our customers located within Australia and New Zealand.

Allnex Resins produces polymer resins from a diverse base of chemical raw materials. We have hundreds of finished resins, all of which are produced in our reactors at our manufacturing plants. Sales of our produced resins represent by far the majority of our revenue, but we do also buy and re-sell various ancillary products to support our customers in the composites industry.

3.3. Supply Chain

The procurement strategy in Australia is developed in consultation with the Allnex Group's Global Procurement Team with the aim of seeking long-term relationships with respected producers and distributors. Allnex Australia seeks to align and leverage global positions, where appropriate, on large volume items used at multiple global sites.

The chemical raw materials required for our production are bought through multiple supply channels, with our primary aim being to transact with the producer directly, if possible and practicable. Where a direct relationship with a manufacturer is not practical or possible, we transact with distributors and traders to source the required products. Our purchases, therefore, include a mixture of direct imported product and locally supplied product. Allnex has in recent times strengthened its approach with a stronger focus on transacting more directly with producers, particularly where volumes are large enough to justify Full Container Load shipments.

The majority of the raw material product purchased comes from Asia, with major countries/regions of manufacture being Singapore, Korea, China, Taiwan, Malaysia, Indonesia, Thailand and Japan. Allnex Resins also sources product from the United States of America, Europe, the Middle East, Africa and other locations globally, in addition to the significant volumes sourced from Australian local suppliers. Where possible, it is also our policy to support local manufacturing in Australia. For example, Allnex Resins' packaging suppliers are all locally based, and the vast majority of Allnex Resins' logistic service suppliers, such as freight, storage and other logistical activities, are also based in Australia. Allnex also supports local manufacture of Hydrocarbon Resins, Glycols, Surfactants, Peroxides and Pigment Dispersions.

While Allnex Resins aims to transact directly with suppliers, for a variety of reasons, it is sometimes necessary to transact through traders and distributors. This may sometimes be due to the specialised nature of the products or at other times due to the trading terms, volume, simplicity, storage requirements/limitations, characteristics of different markets or industries, etc. Nevertheless, Allnex Resins continues to actively engage with third parties to seek from them the same compliance commitments referred to in this Statement.

Allnex Group produces resins globally at its other sites. When goods are purchased from another Allnex Group entity, the purchase and sale is treated as an intercompany transaction. The Allnex Group producers are bound by the same global compliance policies and procedures that Allnex Australia follows.

Allnex Group and Allnex Resins manages supplier performance at both the local and global level, in line with our International Organization for Standardization (**ISO**) accreditation. Allnex conducts an annual review of supplier performance with its principal suppliers. Assessing the risks of modern slavery within the supplier and its supply chain forms part of that review, together with our global Corporate Social Responsibility (**CSR**) evaluation.

Allnex Group has again achieved an Ecovadis Platinum Green rating, putting Allnex in the top 1% of Chemical Companies globally (overall score between 80 and 100) (https://support.ecovadis.com). Allnex Group is also a member of Together for Sustainability (TfS), an international member-driven initiative raising CSR standards throughout the chemical industry. 4. Potential Modern Slavery Risks in Operations and Supply Chain

As detailed further in section 5.2 below, Allnex Resins has identified that the risk of modern slavery in its own operations and supply chain within Australia is very low. This is largely because of Allnex's awareness of, and the processes which it has put in place to ensure compliance with, the legislative and regulatory framework in Australia. Conversely, Allnex Resins has identified that the risks of modern slavery in its supply chain are likely to be relatively higher in relation to direct suppliers of raw materials. Such assessment is based primarily on the country of origin of the supplier, combined with the type of product the supplier is providing or producing.

Considering the complexity of Allnex Resins' supply chain, Allnex Resins has been utilising the services of a professional consulting firm, Intertek, to provide support and expertise in assessing, analysing and managing the risks of modern slavery in its supply chain and operations. For the first two years, this process reviewed direct spend only, but during the last two years, the process has expanded to include indirect spend. The findings have correlated, with the expectation that indirect spend categories have less risk than direct.

Based on Allnex Resins Modern Slavery Steering Committee's review of the process, and on additional expertise becoming available within Allnex's global procurement function, Allnex has decided to amend the current process. Whilst Allnex will continue to use Intertek for audit purposes, Allnex will now transition to an internal process of assessment and analysis in line with global reporting structures for Ecovadis and Together for Sustainability. In making this change, Allnex Australia will also reset the focus back onto its direct suppliers. In addition, as referenced in section 3.2 above, with the closure of Allnex's Botany plant in December 2027, greater emphasis and focus will be put on the current and future suppliers to the operations at the Wacol plant.

Allnex Resins' raw materials largely derive from three major sources: petrochemical-based materials, bio-based materials and mineral-based materials. Allnex Resins has identified that the nature of these sectors and the way they operate could, in some circumstances, expose individuals to the kinds of risks inherent in modern slavery. These risks include forced labour, child labour, excessive working hours, low wages and benefits, inadequate working conditions and unequal treatment, etc. These risks are considered to be potentially higher and more prevalent in under-developed or developing countries than in developed countries due to, for example, poor governance, weak rule of law, conflict, weak or corrupt institutions or other socio-economic factors.

Indirect suppliers to Allnex Resins are predominantly based in Australia and are therefore largely considered to be lower risk for the same reasons that Allnex Resins' Australian operations are considered to be low risk. The main suppliers in this category include providers of utilities, professional services, transport, warehousing, packaging and waste management. Nevertheless, assessment of Allnex Resins indirect suppliers remains in scope and has been reviewed over the past two reporting years, with the findings providing supporting evidence that the risk is low,

Nuplex Resins, Allnex Resins' controlled entity in Vietnam, has many of the same major suppliers as Allnex Resins and operates within the same compliance framework. These common major suppliers are, therefore, covered by the Allnex Group's supplier performance review with regard to CSR. Thus, the identification of modern slavery risks and assessment in relation to Allnex Resins also largely applies to Nuplex Resins.



5. Assessing and Addressing Modern Slavery Risks

Allnex Australia is committed to working with its stakeholders and business partners to assess and address the risks of modern slavery in its operations and supply chain, and to incorporate its approach of managing modern slavery risks into its overall corporate governance and compliance framework.

5.1. Policies and Procedures

Allnex Group operates a comprehensive global corporate compliance program in order to guide its decision-making and to promote ethical, legally compliant and socially responsible business conduct. The Allnex Group has a range of policies which contribute to Allnex Australia's (and indeed the Allnex Group's) commitment to respecting human rights and which support and assist in reducing and, where possible, eliminating modern slavery risks. These policies include the following:

Allnex Group's Code of Conduct sets out the ethical principles which are to apply to all of the Group's operations and is the foundation on which Allnex's business is conducted. The Code of Conduct applies to every director, officer and employee and is available in 14 languages. Any alleged violations of policies and procedures in relation to ethical business behaviour are reviewed and investigated by a dedicated Compliance team comprising senior managers. A new training package on the Code of Conduct was prepared for class room training, with special emphasis on our valued principles of labour and human rights. In the early part of the third quarter of 2022 Allnex launched a company-wide online training and certification on the Allnex Code of Conduct.

The Supplier Code of Conduct is incorporated into Allnex Australia's general terms of purchase and in respective individual purchase agreements for existing suppliers. The Supplier Code of Conduct requires that suppliers are to (amongst other things) act in compliance with the applicable laws of the countries where they operate, conduct business ethically, respect fundamental human rights and provide a safe working environment. Moreover, Allnex Australia reserves the right to terminate any agreement with any supplier that cannot demonstrate compliance with the Supplier Code of Conduct. Allnex intends to review and publish an updated SCoC during the coming year.

All new suppliers are asked to sign the Supplier Code of Conduct upon the implementation of vendor onboarding. Allnex Group has introduced in 2023 a prevendor creation check of each prospective new vendor's CSR score with Ecovadis (or other suitable body). As part of this process, all new vendors are required to provide a DUNS number, whereby the vendor's Ecovadis risk rating can be tracked. (A DUNS number is a unique ninedigit verification code attributed to an organisation and each physical location where its business is conducted).

New or renewed contracts have specific contract terms directed at suppliers identifying and eliminating modern slavery risks in their operations. The scores from Ecovadis and TfS form part of the supplier performance review. Suppliers who are not willing to engage may face no longer being an approved source.

Allnex's Procurement Sustainability Manual embeds CSR considerations (including Allnex's procurement policies) into the various steps of Allnex Group purchasing processes. Allnex's dedicated team of procurement professionals works to ensure responsible partnerships with suppliers.

Refresher training on modern slavery was provided by Intertek to key employees and senior management in Australia in December 2021, including those from the senior leadership team, which represents all the key functions in the business.

What we stand for – Our core values

















In 2022, comprehensive training on modern slavery was provided by Dentons, a prestigious law firm well recognized in the areas of corporate social responsibility and compliance, to the Allnex global management team, including representatives from amongst senior leaders and function heads. A refresher course for Australian employees was undertaken in 2023. New employees will now have online learning as part of their onboard process, and the training is auto-set for a refresher every 2 years.

Allnex strictly adheres to the following principles according to internationally recognised and accepted standards: Allnex embraces diversity and is committed to creating an equitable and inclusive work environment for all employees; Allnex values each of its employees based on their individual talents, aspirations and competence.

At Allnex, we believe diversity is a strength. Allnex strives to create an environment in which personal uniqueness and individuality is celebrated and everyone's contribution is recognized and valued.

5.2 Risk Assessment and Due Diligence

Allnex Group depends on its supply chain to provide thousands of different raw materials from a large number of suppliers. The strategic importance of procurement is therefore also a lever to drive social and environmental improvements across our supply chain. This growing focus on CSR translates in many ways into our procurement practices. Allnex is committed to continuous improvement in its responsible procurement practices. We regularly review and update our procurement policies and procedures to incorporate best practice and evolving sustainability practice.

An important milestone in our continuous improvement journey was at the end of 2022, when Allnex joined the chemical industry initiatives 'Together for Sustainability' (TfS). This member-driven organisation consists of 50 member companies (October 2023) representing a global turnover in the chemical industry of over €800 billion and a global spend of over €500 billion. A main focus in the concept of TfS is the development and implementation of a global supplier engagement process to assess and improve sustainability practices within the supply chains of chemical companies. The program is based on the UN Global Compact and Responsible Care®. The standardized approach of TfS Assessments and Audits is measuring suppliers' performance in key areas such as environmental,

labour & human rights (including modern slavery), ethical and sustainable procurement. The sustainability assessments are performed by EcoVadis. Through the TfS academy, we provide training to our suppliers on sustainability topics. The TfS Academy is offering more than 390 courses in 11 languages. In 2023, 492 audits and 11421 online assessments have been conducted by the TfS members.

Allnex Australia strictly implements Allnex Group's sustainable strategy, and ensures that our trading terms and Supplier Code of Conduct are clearly communicated to our suppliers, so as to ensure responsibility throughout our supply chain. Through these standardized and mandatory documents and procedures, we make sure that expectations and terms are clearly communicated and understood by our suppliers to ensure that they conduct their business in compliance with applicable laws, regulations, industry standards and high sustainability standards. In addition, the need for the prevention of violation of fundamental human rights is clearly communicated and understood by our suppliers.


Allnex strives to establish positive long-term relationships with its suppliers and to foster a culture of true transparency, effective communication and continuous improvement in our procurement practices. In 2023 Allnex Group further developed the supplier performance evaluation framework to gain comprehe nsive insights into the commercial, environmental and social impacts of our suppliers.

The evaluation of the sustainability performance of our suppliers includes corporate environmental, social and governmental drivers that impact the final scoring. We make use of the EcoVadis scorecard results and EcoVadis IQ risk assessment model to assess the sustainability performance of our suppliers.

For the 2023 Group supplier evaluation assessment, allnex has assessed more than 1000 suppliers following the below mentioned Supplier Performance Evaluation Framework. The focus has been on Allnex suppliers who ship the raw materials that are required to produce our finished products. Out of a total of 1135 global vendors, 444 vendors have a linked Sustainability score and associated risk assessment. Allnex is hence on track to risk-assess 80% of our key vendors by 2025.

Depending on the results, the suppliers are assigned to different sustainability risk classes that lead to a number of actions being taken, depending on the risk class or classes to which the supplier has been assigned. Examples of actions are the filling out of Allnex self-assessment questionnaires, participating in an Allnex-led or TfS-led audit or in worst case if no improvement is visible after a certain time complete termination of supply by the particular supplier needs to be considered. The results of the assessment and audits will be shared with respective suppliers and Corrective Action Plans (CAP) will be created.

In 2023, 29 supplier audits were undertaken by Allnex group.



The risk assessment process will be further developed and the scope will be adjusted to cover an increasing number of our vendors. Monitoring and measuring the vendors will increase their awareness and by increased awareness the risk of violation of human rights is expected to be reduced.

Allnex has also used Ariba software to send out global questionnaires to active suppliers in various product categories where the risks of Human Slavery are perceived as being high. Non-compliance in responding to the questionnaire may lead to the disqualification of the supplier as an approved source.

Allnex Australia strictly implements Allnex Group's sustainability strategy, and requires suppliers to follow the strategy, as provided for in its purchasing terms and conditions, contract templates and Supplier Code of Conduct. Through these standardized and mandatory documents and procedures, Allnex ensures that business is done in compliance with applicable laws, regulations, industry standards and high sustainability standards, including the prevention of modern slavery.

The supplier selection process includes an assessment of economic, environmental and social impacts, which forms part of our proprietary checklists. These cover some of the key procurement processes, such as: the supplier approval process, complaint management system, supplier evaluation process, Management of Change process, and the CSR assessment questionnaire which is based on Allnex's Procurement Sustainability Manual. Allnex has recently invested in a new global Management of Change

tool, which brings added benefits around assessing and supporting sustainable practices.

Intertek was engaged to assist in providing a further assessment to analyse and manage modern slavery risks in our supply chain and operations, including services such as supplier mapping and analysis; inherent risk screening; supplier self-assessment; supplier profiling; risk mitigation, supplier analytics and supplier audit. During the year in review, we have utilised the services of Intertek to perform the second round of full audits of the highest-risk suppliers, Within 2023, we also performed audits with 4 suppliers specific to Allnex Resins Australia, which were identified during analysis of reporting year 2022. The audits for two of the entities satisfied Allnex Group that the suppliers were performing in line with all expected regulations. Meanwhile our discussions with the 3rd and 4th suppliers are ongoing, with Allnex still awaiting responses to questions posed to the supplier.

For the reporting year 2024 we have identified three suppliers to be audited based on the 2023 data and responses. Those audits are planned for H2 2024 and will form part of the 2025 statement.

A special Steering Committee of Allnex Australia has been established to oversee and manage Allnex Australia's compliance with Modern Slavery legislation (see section 5.5). This Committee is responsible for reviewing the supplier assessments and evaluating Allnex's responses to this important initiative, as further outlined below.





5.3 Supplier Engagement

The management of the procurement of raw materials is of strategic importance in driving Allnex's sustainability initiative and responding to Allnex's environmental and social responsibilities as a global company. Allnex strives to establish positive long-term relationships with its suppliers and to foster a culture of true transparency, effective communication and continuous improvement in its procurement practices.

Allnex actively engages with its suppliers to address any instances of non-compliance and works collaboratively with suppliers to implement corrective actions. Depending on the risk classification, Allnex has the following tools available to get a comprehensive insight into the commercial, environmental and social impacts. For suppliers with a sustainability risk, we are mainly using EcoVadis Assessments and TfS audits.

The results of the assessment and audits will be shared with respective suppliers and Corrective Action Plans (CAP) will be created. We also challenge suppliers to proactively provide Allnex with options that promote a Sustainable future. We have a global program known as "Supplier Interconnected Activities" that identifies

products at high risk of Modern Slavery within a supplier's portfolio (for instance Conflict Minerals) and then seek to gain further input from the supplier on the origin, sustainability and labour practices involved in the production and supply of such materials.

5.4 Remediation/Redress

As outlined in section 5.1 above, Allnex Group has implemented a number of policies and procedures which have the effect of enforcing respect for human rights and addressing modern slavery risks in its operations and supply chains. Some of the policies and procedures provide avenues for redress where issues are identified and raised, including the hotline to report Code of Conduct violations and the Australian Whistle-blower Policy.

The Australian Whistle-blower Policy was reviewed and updated in early 2022, to ensure a clear channel for reporting, the protection of the whistle-blower and investigation into the allegations with due diligence.

There is an ongoing periodic review of policies and procedures generally to ensure that they meet Allnex Group's commitment to the support of human rights and the elimination and prevention of modern slavery risks.

In addition to these measures, additional provisions aimed at requiring the supplier's compliance with human rights and labor laws are proposed to be added to new procurement agreements aimed at ensuring that Allnex's suppliers are not involved in modern slavery practices. Allnex Resins plans to modify and implement such provisions to more standard contract templates and general terms and conditions, as well as individual agreements.

If an employee has a concern that any supplier may be involved in modern slavery practices or that any potential modern slavery risks may lie within Allnex's own operations, these concerns can be reported to the Steering Committee, the Allnex Legal & Compliance team, senior managers in Australia, or the compliance hotline. These avenues of redress have been incorporated into different internal and external policies which must be followed and implemented by Allnex employees or suppliers.

On receiving a complaint or notification of an issue, the Steering Committee and Legal & Compliance team will conduct comprehensive investigation, initiate third party audit (if necessary) and remediate properly (if the matter raised is found to be of substance).



5.5. Modern Slavery Management Steering Committee

The Modern Slavery Management Steering Committee of Allnex Australia consists of local senior management and includes personnel from relevant departments including Procurement, Planning and Logistics, Finance, Legal, Compliance, Human Resources and Manufacturing.

The Committee's purpose and function is to have oversight and management of the management and monitoring of modern slavery risks within Allnex Resins. The Committee assists with assessing and addressing modern slavery risks and implementing Allnex's processes and procedures aimed at eliminating modern slavery risks in Allnex's operations and in its supply chains. Two of the directors of all three entities of Allnex Australia sit on the Committee. Other directors are updated, and consulted with, on these issues on a regular basis.


Global level management from Finance, Legal, Compliance and other relevant department, as well as the key team members from our controlled entity, Nuplex Resins, will continue to be involved in monitoring and managing the risk of modern slavery.



5.6. Additional Developments

Allnex Australia is committed to keep improving its modern slavery risk control management in various manners. In addition to the foregoing:

- 1) Allnex Australia contributed to our global key achievements in operational excellence in 2021-2023: ECOVADIS Platinum status awarded for outstanding performance in terms of sustainability and operational reliability.
- 2) Allnex Group joined the Diversity & Inclusion ("D&I") sessions organized by the United Nations Global Compact to further strengthen adoption of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). As a result, D&I networks were created; D&I awareness training was launched, and will be further implemented to Australia.



6. Assessing the Effectiveness of Our Actions

The Steering Committee continues to meet regularly to review, discuss, and assess the effectiveness of the implemented measures, any necessary adjustment on the annual and quarterly plans, and the progresses made during each period.

The Steering Committee also tracks the status of supplier risk assessment, screening, and any potential target for third party due diligence on a case by case basis. Minutes and actions of each meeting are logged and tracked. Representatives of the Committee liaise with Allnex's global sustainability team to ensure that global best practice standards are adhered to in Australia.

Allnex Australia continues to promote the awareness of modern slavery risks amongst its employees by communications and training. In addition, Allnex Australia purposefully promotes and urges suppliers to develop, improve and effectively enforce their own modern slavery risk management frameworks. Allnex Group is seeking to utilise a newly extended online training tool within our HR system in order to ensure all staff are educated on this topic. The course includes mandatory questions and pass-rate in order to ensure specifically that staff involved in our Supply Chain operations understand the importance of the legislation.



By fully adopting environmental, social and governance (ESG) practices, we make the world's goals our own. While doing so in a holistic manner, there are three SDGs that lend themselves particularly to allnex's contributions.
