MODERN SLAVERY STATEMENT 2020


This statement is made in accordance with the Australian Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth) (the Act) by Village Roadshow Pty Ltd (VRL, Village, We, Us or Our) (ABN 43 010 672 054). This statement is submitted as a joint statement on behalf of VRL and VRL's subsidiary reporting entities listed in Appendix A (VRL Group).

INTRODUCTION

Village commenced business in Melbourne, Australia in 1954 where it remains headquartered. Village owns a diversified portfolio of businesses including Theme Parks, Cinema Exhibition, Film Distribution and Marketing Solutions and has approximately 5,000 employees, predominantly based in Australia.

Village is committed to identifying and reducing the risk of modern slavery from the VRL Group and its supply chain and this statement sets out the actions taken by us to minimise the risk of modern slavery occurring in our business and supply chain over the financial year ended 30 June 2020.

VRL was listed on the Australian Securities Exchange (ASX: VRL) for the financial year ended 30 June 2020 (FY20). Subsequent to the financial year end and following the implementation of a scheme of arrangement, VRL was removed from the Official List of ASX Limited at the close of trading on 30 December 2020. VRL is now a wholly owned subsidiary of VRG HoldCo Pty Ltd.



STRUCTURE, OPERATIONS AND SUPPLY CHAIN

The VRL Group sources a range of goods and services from a significant number of suppliers. These include those set out in the table below.

The diversity of the products and geographic location of some suppliers and their supply chains can potentially expose the VRL Group to risks associated with modern slavery. The VRL Group is committed to reducing this risk and has developed a framework to mitigate the risks. Our policy is available on the Village Roadshow corporate website www.villageroadshow.com.au.

RISKS OF MODERN SLAVERY PRACTICES IN THE VRL GROUP'S OPERATIONS AND SUPPLY CHAINS

As characterised in the table above, the VRL Group procures a range of goods and services both locally and internationally. The VRL Group conducted a risk assessment of modern slavery practices in its supply chain based on the definition of Modern Slavery in the Act. The VRL Group's risk assessment of its supply chain identified the following risk categories which warranted further assessment:



1. GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATION

A number of countries have been identified by the UN, and noted in the Global Slavery Index of 2018, as having varying levels of human rights protections, including labour rights. The VRL Group sources a number of goods from international suppliers and has deemed international supply as a risk category due to the likelihood of the impacts of known modern slavery risk factors.



2. DIRECT SPEND

The relationship, the size of the supplier and the annual direct spend made with the supplier were considerations to determine the further assessment of those suppliers.



3. KNOWN INDUSTRY RISKS

Industry specific risks were highlighted as a risk category due to the type of product or service supplied to the VRL Group. It was identified as a risk category as there are known risks or potential exposure to modern slavery practices in certain supply chains based on historical modern slavery violations or noncompliance.



ACTIONS TAKEN BY THE VRL GROUP

VRL acknowledges that there are risks of modern slavery practices in the VRL Group supply chain. In order to address these risks, the VRL Group took various actions in FY20.

The VRL Group developed a Modern Slavery
Framework and established a Modern Slavery
Steering Committee with the aim of reducing the
risk of modern slavery, working with suppliers to
assess risks of modern slavery in their supply chains
and improve compliance with the Modern Slavery
Framework through training and communication.

The VRL Group has a significant number of suppliers. It was necessary to map the supply chain and segment suppliers into categories to focus on the higher risk groups. In FY20 we targeted tier 1 suppliers, the tier 1 suppliers were then classified into one of the three risk categories identified by the VRL Group's risk assessment, being geographical location, direct spend and known industry risks. This sub-category was known as Category A suppliers. The assessment process, steps and actions taken by the VRL Group in FY20 focused on Category A suppliers.

UPDATE AND DEVELOP DOCUMENTATION

VRL adopted a Modern Slavery Framework and recognised the importance guiding principles have on improving practices within an organisation. Following the adoption of the framework, VRL completed a review of its policies and documents to ensure compliance with the Act. We developed the VRL Modern Slavery Policy and published it on the VRL company website. The Modern Slavery Policy addresses the actions the VRL Group has taken and will undertake regarding modern slavery. The VRL document review resulted in the following:

- Developed self-assessment questionnaire
- Developed Modern Slavery Policy
- Developed Supplier Non-Compliance process
- Updated Supplier Code of Conduct
- Updated Group Procurement Policy
- Updated contract templates

RISK ASSESSMENTS

The risk based assessments undertaken during the FY20 reporting period included developing a self-assessment questionnaire (SAQ) for suppliers. The SAQ incorporates questions addressing risks of modern slavery practices of suppliers and, where relevant, of a supplier's supply chain. The SAQ included modern slavery risk based questions as well as other risk areas relevant to the VRL Group.

The SAQ, together with the updated Supplier Code of Conduct, was issued to Category A suppliers, new suppliers onboarded during FY20 and those suppliers involved in tendering processes.

TRAINING

A tiered training program addressing modern slavery was rolled out across the VRL Group. A group wide overview of the modern slavery regime was presented to staff, followed by face to face training with senior managers and finally an online training module to relevant employees.

The face to face training allowed policies, processes and risks to be discussed by business managers prior to a wider distribution throughout the organisation.

The online training module was undertaken by relevant staff across the VRL Group. The training materials defined modern slavery, outlined the internal policies and processes, provided awareness of the modern slavery risks in the VRL Group's supply chains, and considerations and questions to ask when engaging suppliers.



EFFECTIVENESS OF THE VRL GROUP'S ACTIONS

The VRL Group has improved its policies and procedures relating to modern slavery risks. We have recognised gaps in existing policies and adopted new policies to strengthen our governance position. The procurement related policies were centrally developed, endorsed by the VRL Audit and Risk Committee and are applicable to the entire VRL Group. We have published our adopted Modern Slavery Policy on the corporate website which makes the VRL Group more accountable and raises awareness of the risks and our compliance under the Act to our customers and suppliers.

The implementation of the modern slavery training program, via our staff training program, is raising awareness within our employee population and ensures that the information being received is applicable to VRL's businesses.

VRL had a KPI relating to the number of SAQs and Supplier Codes of Conduct received from Category A suppliers across the VRL Group. VRL met the KPI for the FY20 period and was able to analyse responses from the SAQs to improve the SAQ questions in identifying potential future risks. The SAQ also enabled us to ask further questions of suppliers and get a greater understanding of extended supply chains in order to assess risk.

The Modern Slavery Steering Committee consists of senior VRL executives. The Steering Committee met with the project team during the year to review the actions taken by the VRL Group, to discuss any risks or potential risks identified and to ensure targets set are being achieved.



VRL GROUP CONSULTATION

All reporting entities are subsidiaries of VRL and for FY20 all reporting entities operated under the same governance and reporting structure. The VRL Board and the Modern Slavery Steering Committee have contributed to the adoption of the Modern Slavery Framework and drafting of this statement. The VRL Group adhere to the Act, the Modern Slavery Framework developed and adopted by each reporting entity and the governing resolution passed by VRL's Audit and Risk Committee.

OTHER INFORMATION

Impact of COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on the operations of many of the VRL Group businesses. VRL continues to work with its suppliers to monitor the risk of modern slavery in its supply chain. During the COVID-19 pandemic we continued communications with our suppliers to understand where risk profiles may have changed.
