This is Healius Limited's Modern Slavery Statement ("Statement") covering FY 2025, issued under the Australian Modern Slavery Act. This Statement outlines what Healius and its subsidiaries ("Healius") have done to detect and prevent modern slavery and human trafficking risks in its business and supply chains.

About Healius

For over 35 years, Healius has been one of Australia’s leading healthcare companies. We are committed to supporting quality, affordable and accessible healthcare for all Australians.

Healius is one of Australia’s leading providers of private medical laboratory and pathology services. Our Pathology business operates 96 medical laboratories and around 1,982 patient collection centres throughout Australia. It employs over 200 pathologists and around 6,100 full time equivalent staff comprising of scientists, technicians, collectors, couriers and other team members.

Healius’ commitment to human rights and the eradication of all types of modern slavery is overseen by the Healius Board, supported by the Executive Leadership Team and management with responsibilities in this area. Our approach to modern slavery risk management builds upon our 'Ways of Leading' values and established frameworks as an accredited healthcare provider and public listed company in Australia, including our Risk Management Framework, Standards of Behaviour and Conduct Policy, Procurement Policy, Supplier Code of Conduct and Whistleblower Protection Policy.


Legal entities covered by this Statement

Healius is a leading Australian healthcare company providing diagnostic services to consumers and referring practitioners, as well as enabling a range of healthcare professionals to deliver patient care in partnership with Healius' support staff. Healius is listed on the Australian Securities Exchange and is headquartered in Sydney, NSW.

In addition to Healius Limited, Healius comprises a number of separate subsidiary companies whose activities are consolidated as a part of the Healius Group ("Group"). Healius Ltd makes this joint statement for the reporting entities listed below.

This Statement covers the financial year ended 30 June 2025 and has been prepared on a consolidated basis. The Group sold the Lumus Imaging business on 1 May 2025 and has excluded it from this Statement. The legal entities covered by this Statement and a description of the businesses through which these legal entities deliver healthcare services to Australian healthcare professionals and patients is set out below.

Our business operations

Operating nationally under a variety of established state-based and specialty brands, Healius Pathology provides leading medical laboratory and pathology services across key diagnostic activities. These include anatomical pathology (histopathology and cytology), clinical pathology (biochemistry, haematology, immunology and microbiology), genomic diagnostics and veterinary pathology.

With a presence in every state and territory across Australia, Healius Pathology brands include QML Pathology, Laverty Pathology, Dorevitch Pathology, Western Diagnostic Pathology, TML Pathology, and Abbott Pathology which operate in Queensland, New South Wales (including Australian Capital Territory), Victoria, Western Australia and Northern Territory, Tasmania, and South Australia respectively.

Key specialty brands include:

- Genomic Diagnostics, one of Australia's leading non-government diagnostic genetic sequencing facilities
- Kossard Dermatopathologists, leader in dermatopathology with an established reputation in the specialist community
- Agilix Biolabs, Australia's largest, most experienced and scientifically advanced bioanalytical laboratory with over 25 years' experience in clinical trials and providing bioanalytical services for therapeutics, immunoassay bioanalysis of large molecules, biologics and vaccine development
- Specialist Veterinary Services, a network of veterinary pathology laboratories trading as Vetnostics.



Each year, approximately one in four Medicare funded pathology tests are processed in our laboratories. Healius Pathology's services extend from exclusively servicing some of Australia's largest and most complex private and public hospitals to regional areas and remote Indigenous communities.

Our people within our operations

All of Healius' operations are in Australia and include salaried staff, employees under collective bargaining arrangements and modern pay awards, temporary contractors and casual employees.

Approximately 80% of staff (excluding temporary contractors) are covered by an industrial instrument such as modern awards or enterprise agreements. The terms of these instruments lessen the prospects of conduct within our operations that could deteriorate into modern slavery.

Healius' systems aim for continuous improvement in its treatment of employees including compensation, work-life balance, financial and non-financial benefits, support professional development and health and safety.

Our supply chains and procurement framework

Across the scope of its operations, Healius sources a wide array of healthcare-related products and services, as well as more usual business-related products and services.

Key supply chain classes are:

- Medical consumable expenses (e.g. personal protective equipment, specimen containers, reagents)
- Property rental expense

- Utilities and other property related services (e.g. facilities management services such as cleaning and security)
- Repairs and maintenance (including equipment)
- IT expenses (IT hardware, software and third-party support)
- General expenses (including non-medical consumables such as office supplies, general staff and travel costs, motor vehicles, workers compensation and insurance costs, Pathology third-party courier and referred work, consultants, professional services).

Healius draws from both domestic and international suppliers to ensure the provision of quality, ethical products and services to generate optimum value with a whole-of-life focus.

In evaluating our preferred suppliers and strategic partners, our selection criteria include understanding the resilience of their supply chain, methods of production, labour hire practices and value for money. The evaluation includes detailed assessments of how the supplier addresses the risks of modern slavery both within their control and also upstream from suppliers of input goods and services. Suppliers are required to adhere to Healius' policies and procedures, in particular, our Procurement Policy and our Supplier Code of Conduct.

Procurement Policy

Healius' Procurement Policy ensures that procurement activities are conducted commercially, ethically and sustainably to generate optimum value with a whole-of-life focus. The Policy covers the following:

Supplier relationships

Healius is committed to building a strong reputation with suppliers by demonstrating probity, integrity, impartiality, confidentiality, transparency, accountability and respect by partnering and managing relationships strategically with suppliers.

Labour, Human Rights and Modern Slavery

Healius is opposed to all forms of slavery and expects its suppliers to respect human rights and ensure that they do not engage in or are complicit with human rights abuses.

Ethics

Healius is committed to a culture of corporate compliance and ethical behaviour and expects its suppliers to carry out their duties ethically, responsibly and without improper influences, and thereby protect the integrity of the business.

Sustainability

Where possible, procurement should have the most positive environmental, social and economic impact over the entire lifecycle of a good or service following a risk-based approach.

Managing risk

Our aim is to ensure that all procurement is conducted within a framework in compliance with Group procedures, tools and templates, based on a risk-based approach. Conflicts of interest are considered and managed appropriately.

Health and safety

Our aim is to provide a safe and efficient workplace without injuries to staff, contractors and the public. We expect suppliers to be accountable and responsible for managing their health and safety risk.

Environment

Healius is committed to managing operations in an environmentally sustainable manner and expects its suppliers to maximise resource efficiency and reduce the consumption of energy and natural resources and waste.

Diversity and inclusion

We recognise that a diverse and inclusive workplace is one in which all individuals, with a broad range of backgrounds, skills, experience and perspectives, contribute to our success. We also expect our suppliers to promote an inclusive and diverse workforce.

Value

Healius is committed to obtaining the best overall outcome in terms of value for money, performance and whole-of-life-costs by leveraging the full purchasing power of the Healius Group. Value for money is demonstrated through competitive process and/or rigorous benchmarking.





Our governance and risk framework

Our governance and risk frameworks are overseen by the Board and its sub-committees including the Risk Management Committee. We are committed to maintaining high ethical standards, conducting business with integrity and mitigating risks associated with human rights abuses and modern slavery practices.

Governance structure



Healius works within an accountable system that includes corporate governance policies and practices, and risk management processes. These are designed to promote and strengthen responsible management.

Our Risk Management Framework formalises the approach adopted to manage risk and provides Healius with a consistent methodology to be applied to all strategic, operational and contractual objectives. Healius assesses the consequence of likelihood of risks in all significant areas of the business including modern slavery.

The Risk Management Framework is supported by a range of policies that ensure we operate in a manner that is safe, ethical and compliant. Some policies relate specifically to modern slavery, while others are more general in nature and refer to our ethical standards and human rights responses.

As part of its commitment to managing the risks, these policies are continually reviewed to ensure compliance with all legislation, including modern slavery.

- Standards of Behaviour and Conduct Policy
- Anti-bribery and Anti-fraud Policy
- Risk Management Policy
- Procurement Policy
- Supplier Code of Conduct

Our FY 2025 measures to address modern slavery risks

Healius is committed to respecting all human rights and to the eradication of all types of modern slavery associated with our business. Healius believes that this commitment is fundamental to a sustainable future.

Healius continues to build and improve on its response to modern slavery. This includes detecting potential modern slavery risks in our operations and supply chains, implementing mitigating actions, developing tools to assess effectiveness and educating our people. We assess the effectiveness of our actions to identify, mitigate and address modern slavery risks through defined KPIs, annual supplier due diligence, contract compliance checks, staff training outcomes, and governance reviews.

In FY 2025:

- our supplier due diligence questionnaires achieved a 94% questionnaire response rate among targeted suppliers;
- our risk evaluation assessed 99% of supplier spend as low risk;
- all new supplier agreements continued to include modern slavery clauses and our Supplier Code of Conduct;
- we delivered compulsory modern slavery training to relevant staff;
- there were no reports of potential concerns relating to modern slavery risk.

These initiatives, and other measures which Healius carried out to address modern slavery risks and assess the effectiveness of its actions in FY 2025 are detailed below.

Consultation and review

Consultation with external parties

Consultation and enquiries with relevant stakeholders including suppliers and industry peers to understand their approach to modern slavery and actions going forward. Healius reviewed its supplier landscape and requested key suppliers to participate in our annual modern slavery questionnaire and for them to provide their most recent modern slavery compliance statements. In FY 2025 Healius expanded our questionnaire to 15% more suppliers than the previous year, as well more industry vectors to improve coverage.

We continue to use UNSPSC classifications to track spend data to identify suppliers who may be at risk of modern slavery. This allows us to conduct more thorough due diligence on those suppliers identified, working with them to develop and implement responsible sourcing practices, or potentially even terminating the relationship if the risk cannot be sufficiently mitigated to an acceptable level.

Consultation with internal parties including subsidiaries

Healius has a centralised Procurement function that is responsible for sourcing across the Group and covers all operating subsidiaries, apart from Agilex Biolabs which has its own Procurement function. This ensures a consistent and standardised approach to assessment of modern slavery risks and consultation with our suppliers. Healius has established a Human Rights & Ethical Procurement working group, with representatives across different centralised departments such as Procurement, Legal & Risk, People & Culture and Agilex Biolabs. As a part of Healius' internal consultation process, the working group meets biannually at a minimum to discuss modern slavery risks within our operations including ways to improve our processes and modern slavery disclosures.

Modern slavery education

Our Modern Slavery training module is compulsory for our people, with a focus on those in procurement roles, to ensure our people are aware of modern slavery (including what it is) and the associated risks, Healius' obligations under legislation, and steps that can be taken if a modern slavery risk is identified.

Risk framework

Healius continually reviews key policies to ensure compliance with all legislation, including modern slavery.

Procurement

Procurement procedures

Our centralised Procurement function ensures contract terms are standardised and consistent across suppliers, and compliant with Healius' policies. This leads to greater levels of accountability and collaboration.

When evaluating our preferred suppliers and strategic partners, our selection criteria include understanding the resilience of the supply chain, methods of production, labour hire practices and value for money. The evaluation includes detailed assessments of how the supplier addresses the risks of modern slavery both within their control and upstream from suppliers of input goods and services.

Supplier Code of Conduct

Healius' Supplier Code of Conduct has been incorporated into supplier contracts and purchase orders, specifically referencing our respect of human rights and expectation that our suppliers ensure that they do not engage in or are complicit in any human rights abuses, including modern slavery.

Modern slavery contract clauses

Where possible, all new agreements continue to include provisions which prohibit the supplier from engaging in conduct or activities that would constitute modern slavery and compels suppliers to provide records as required for Healius to comply with the Modern Slavery Act. The contract clause specifies that non-compliance would be in breach of these new Agreements and references various punitive actions which could result from non-compliance.

Risk evaluation protocol

Supply chain risk is assessed using a risk assessment tool which combines overall spend by supplier within the Healius Group and specific evaluation criteria which quantifies risk based on the following:

- Internal policies including whistleblower protections and staff training practices.
- Vendor employment practices (such as migrant and student employment practices).
- Geographic location of operations (consideration is given to the prevalence of corruption or weak rule of law).
- Vendor operating model (labour hire and outsourcing, aggressive pricing practices, complex or non-transparent supply chains).
- Industry types such as medical personal protective equipment, cleaning, security and IT support services.

The results of Healius' modern slavery risk evaluation are set out in the following section.

Our FY 2025 risk evaluation

To ensure that modern slavery risk is appropriately managed, Healius focused on identification and evaluation of potential risk areas including, as noted above, overall spend and identification of jurisdictions and industries that pose a higher risk.

Major categories of our external spend in the financial year were identified as follows:

FY 2025 expenses by category¹



In FY 2025, Healius conducted a comprehensive assessment of modern slavery risks across all external expenditure, which can be categorised into the following three key areas of procurement spend:

- Clinical procurement – covering medical consumables and related supplies
- Information Technology (IT) – covering hardware, software, and third-party support services
- Corporate services – covering general operation, property management and repairs and maintenance.

The assessment aimed to identify and evaluate areas within each category where modern slavery risks within the supply chain may be elevated, with a focus on compliance, due diligence, and risk mitigation.

In addition, the following risk factors were also considered as part of the evaluation.

- Employment practices which rely on temporary labour, international student labour, itinerant workers
- Business models which rely on high levels of labour hire, outsourced services or manufacturing in developing countries, franchises, known complex supply chains
- Sourcing of goods or services from geographic locations where corruption indices are high, rule of law is poor, displacement of people is high, known failures in protection of human rights by the government.

General risk ratings were assigned to each category based on these considerations, and the assessment found that 99% of suppliers evaluated by value were classified as low risk.

The risk evaluation allows Healius to identify suppliers deemed to have a higher risk profile and enables a more targeted approach when deciding which suppliers to include as a part of the annual modern slavery questionnaire. In FY 2025, Healius extended coverage to multiple industry verticals and increased the number supplier survey participants by 15%.



Profile of suppliers evaluated in FY 2025

Selected suppliers reflected a diverse distribution across key attributes, including geographical location, procurement categories, industry sectors, workforce size and annual turnover.

Evaluated Supplier Profile by Industry



Majority of Healius' suppliers were at either ends of the spectrum and were either large corporations with an annual turnover greater than \$1 billion with over 10,000 employees, or were small vendors with an annual turnover less than \$50 million and less than 100 employees. Consistent with the existing supplier landscape, vast majority of suppliers were Australian based.

Based on the results of Healius' modern slavery supplier questionnaire:

- 61% of respondents are required to report under the Modern Slavery Act.
- 55% of respondents assess modern slavery risks as a part of their supplier selection and onboarding processes.
- All respondents monitor compliance with relevant modern slavery and human rights policies.
- No known or suspected instances of modern slavery issues were noted with their supply chains.

Consultation

The Healius Group essentially operates in an integrated manner with a management structure consisting of a national procurement team and centralised finance team. The Group also operates under a uniform framework of policies and procedures.

A Human Rights & Ethical Procurement working group was established in 2025 and is comprised of key personnel from our procurement and finance teams, as well as members from other functions of the Healius Group. The working group is responsible for coordinating consultation across the Healius Group modern slavery risks and the actions taken to address those risks. The working group meets regularly and provides insights and updates to management as required throughout the reporting period, drawing on discussions, activities and

actions undertaken from the ongoing consultations with each of the Reporting Entities, and the entities they own or control.

The working group oversees the implementation and monitoring of modern slavery initiatives across all entities, and ensures a consistent approach to managing modern slavery risks throughout the Group.

This Statement was prepared in conjunction with the working group and a number of key stakeholders and representatives from Healius's core business functions including the Secretariat and the Legal Team, who provided input and feedback on the Statement. The working group reviewed the Statement before it was provided to the Board for final review and approval.

Our next steps

Healius will continue to develop and improve our processes to identify, manage and assess the effectiveness of our actions going forward. Our FY 2026 key actions are as follows:

Procurement

Collaborative engagement

Ongoing collaborative engagement with Tier 1 suppliers in cleaning, medical consumables, personal protective equipment, end-user computing and other areas that may be deemed higher risk.

Supplier Code of Conduct

Ensuring our Supplier Code of Conduct is understood and adhered to by all major suppliers and follow-up as required.

Due diligence and follow up

Undertaking annual due diligence and, if required, remediation with key suppliers in identified key risk areas via annual supplier questionnaires, interviews, and site visits. Healius will aim to increase the scope of these enquiries even further for FY 2026. We will again report on the effectiveness of these processes from FY 2026.

Industry platforms

Continue to review industry platforms which enable access to real time information on modern slavery risks within our industry supply chain.

Key Performance Indicators

Continue to assess appropriate Key Performance Indicators to measure our effectiveness in assessing and addressing modern slavery issues.

Consultation

Internal accountability pathways

Continue to review clear lines of accountability within the business across key disciplines in operations and procurement to ensure modern slavery risk can be both monitored and controlled.

Training module

Continue to educate our people on modern slavery with the deployment of the compulsory training module to raise staff awareness around modern slavery and the Group's obligations under the current legislation.

Risk framework

Risk Registers

Continue to assess modern slavery risks, and where appropriate, include in the Group's risk registers which are ultimately reported to and reviewed by the Board's Risk Management Committee.
