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ABOUT THIS STATEMENT

This Modern Slavery Statement (Statement) has been prepared by the Acciona Infrastructure Group (Australia & New Zealand) to address the requirements of the Modern Slavery Act 2018 (Cth). Our Water business has been added as a voluntary member within this Statement. It does not include or reference the Acciona Concesiones or Energy businesses which form part of the global Acciona Group.

The Statement is Acciona Infrastructure’s fourth modern slavery statement and covers the period 1 January 2025 to 31 December 2025 in respect of the Australian reporting entities identified within Appendix B.

The reporting entities are referred to throughout this Statement collectively and generically as “Acciona”, “we”, “us” and “our”.

The term “suppliers” includes suppliers of goods and services, including providers of labour hire.

This Statement is the product of collaborative effort and input from our Procurement, Business Systems Assurance, Sustainability, Governance, Compliance & Legal, and Marketing & Communications teams across multiple reporting entities.

The Statement was approved in June 2026 on behalf of all reporting entities by the Board of Acciona Infrastructure Asia Pacific Pty Ltd, the most senior holding entity in the Australia & New Zealand Infrastructure Group.

MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

Our purpose is to challenge the present to make the future possible. We do this by delivering infrastructure solutions that contribute to a more positive society and by holding ourselves to high standards of responsibility, integrity, and care for people.

As our business continues to grow across Australia and New Zealand, we recognise that our responsibility extends beyond compliance. The construction and infrastructure sector carries inherent modern slavery risks, particularly through labour hire, subcontracting, and complex supply chains. These risks require constant attention, strong governance, and a willingness to challenge established ways of working.

During the past year, we have continued to strengthen our approach to managing modern slavery risks, guided by the people-centric pillar of our Sustainability Master Plan 2025. We have deepened our focus on transparency, strengthened supplier due diligence, and embedded risk management more firmly into project delivery and procurement practices.

While most of our sourcing occurs within Australia, we recognise that modern slavery can exist in any market. In 2025, we sharpened our focus on labour-intensive activities and internationally sourced goods, using data, risk mapping, audits, and industry collaboration to better understand and manage exposure where risk is higher. This includes increased oversight of labour hire arrangements, enhanced site-based controls, and closer engagement with suppliers and partners.

Our ambition goes beyond risk mitigation. We seek to create working environments where exploitation has no place, where workers are treated with dignity and respect, and where our projects contribute positively to communities. Through collaboration with industry peers, regulators, suppliers, and workers themselves, we continue to play an active role in lifting standards across our sector.

ACCIONA will continue to strengthen its processes, partnerships, and accountability to protect human rights and to demonstrate that infrastructure can and must be a force for positive social outcomes.

GLOBAL BUSINESS OVERVIEW

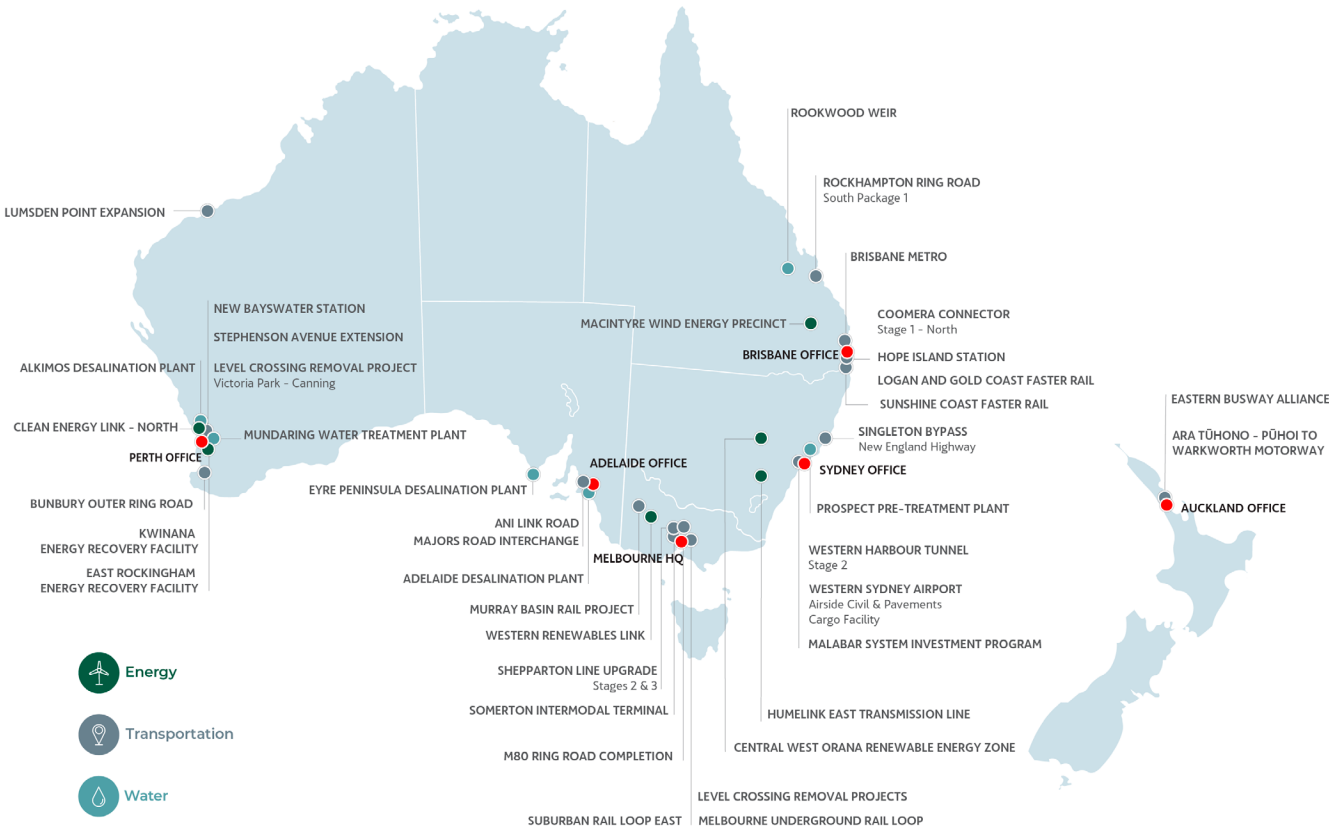

SUPPLY CHAIN

OVERVIEW OF ACCIONA'S SUPPLY CHAIN

ACCIONA's supply chain is extensive, reflecting the scale and complexity of its operations across Australia. During the 2025 reporting period, ACCIONA engaged 57,439 suppliers globally, representing a minor increase from 2024. In Australia, ACCIONA engaged 5,149 suppliers, representing a slight decrease from the previous reporting period.

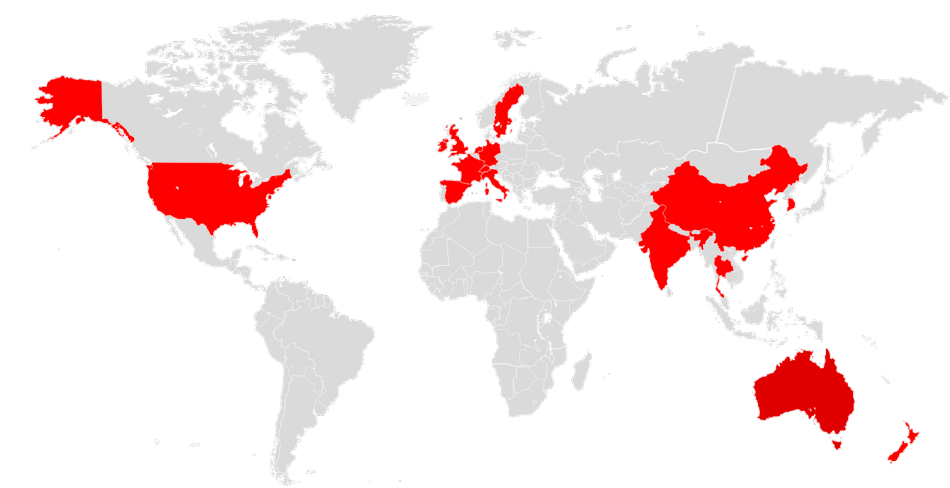
During the reporting period, ACCIONA onboarded 1,151 new suppliers in Australia reflecting the increasing maturity and consolidation of ACCIONA's supplier base, as well as a continued focus on strengthening long-term, sustainable relationships with established suppliers across its operations.

SUPPLY CHAIN BY GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATIONS

ACCIONA's supply chain spans multiple countries, reflecting the increasing diversity of our procurement activities (Figure 1). Local Australian suppliers remain the cornerstone of our supply chain, accounting for 98% of total purchases. The remaining procurement is sourced internationally, with Spain (0.5%), China (0.3%), France (0.2%), the United States of America (0.2%) and Singapore (0.2%) comprising the top five countries from which we source products and services.

From a Modern Slavery perspective, while the substantial majority of ACCIONA's procurement is sourced domestically, the residual international component reinforces the importance of ACCIONA's systematic approach to Supply Chain governance. ACCIONA recognises that labour protection standards and enforcement mechanisms can vary between jurisdictions and accordingly maintains comprehensive supply chain due diligence processes to identify, assess and manage potential modern slavery risks. This proactive approach supports ACCIONA's commitment to responsible sourcing and continuous improvement across its global operations.

SUPPLY CHAIN BY PRODUCT CATEGORY

Notably, plant and equipment purchase ranks as the highest spending category, highlighting both the scale of ACCIONA's construction activities and its increasing exposure to complex, often international, supply chains for major capital assets. Significant investment is also evident across construction and civil engineering services, reinforcing their central role in project execution.

IDENTIFYING RISK OF MODERN SLAVERY PRACTICES

ACCIONA's assessment of modern slavery risks in 2025 confirms that the key risk areas identified in 2024 remain materially unchanged, reflecting the inherent characteristics of the construction industry, including extensive subcontracting, complex multi-tier supply chains, and global sourcing of goods and services.

In 2025, ACCIONA continues to recognise modern slavery risks associated with:

- Outsourced and subcontracted labour models
- Limited transparency in extended supply chains
- Procurement of goods and materials from higher-risk regions

EMERGING RISK CONSIDERATIONS IN 2025

01. LABOUR HIRE

Labour Hire is identified as a high-risk procurement category as per ACCIONA's risk map, reflecting the inherent challenges associated with visibility over worker engagement, employment conditions, and compliance within outsourced labour arrangements. Continued growth in major infrastructure delivery has driven increased demand for specialist and short-term labour, heightening reliance on labour hire providers and associated subcontracting arrangements. This may involve engagement of temporary migrant workers, who may face elevated vulnerability to exploitation due to visa-tied employment conditions, employer-dependent sponsorship arrangements, limited awareness of workplace rights, and reluctance to report grievances. These factors can reduce visibility over employment conditions and increase the risk of modern slavery practices within labour-intensive project activities.

02. CONSTRUCTION SUBCONTRACTING

Multi-tier subcontracting arrangements attract a high degree of risk across major infrastructure projects. The extensive use of subcontractors in construction delivery has the potential to create fragmented chains of responsibility, reducing direct visibility over labour practices, worker welfare, and compliance with employment standards at lower tiers.

03. EXPANSION OF INTERNATIONALLY-SOURCED PROCUREMENT

High spend on major plant, equipment, and prefabricated components has increased exposure to international manufacturing supply chains, where labour standards, environmental protections, and regulatory enforcement may vary significantly by jurisdiction. This presents heightened risks not only in relation to labour exploitation, but also with respect to environmental compliance and sustainability practices across extended supply chains, necessitating robust due diligence across both social and environmental factors.

ACCIONA'S ACTIONS TO ASSESS AND ADDRESS MODERN SLAVERY RISK

Recognising the dynamic nature of the Supply Chain and its associated risks, ACCIONA focused on the following actions to assess and mitigate modern slavery risk in addition to the measures previously implemented.

GOVERNANCE IN OPERATIONS

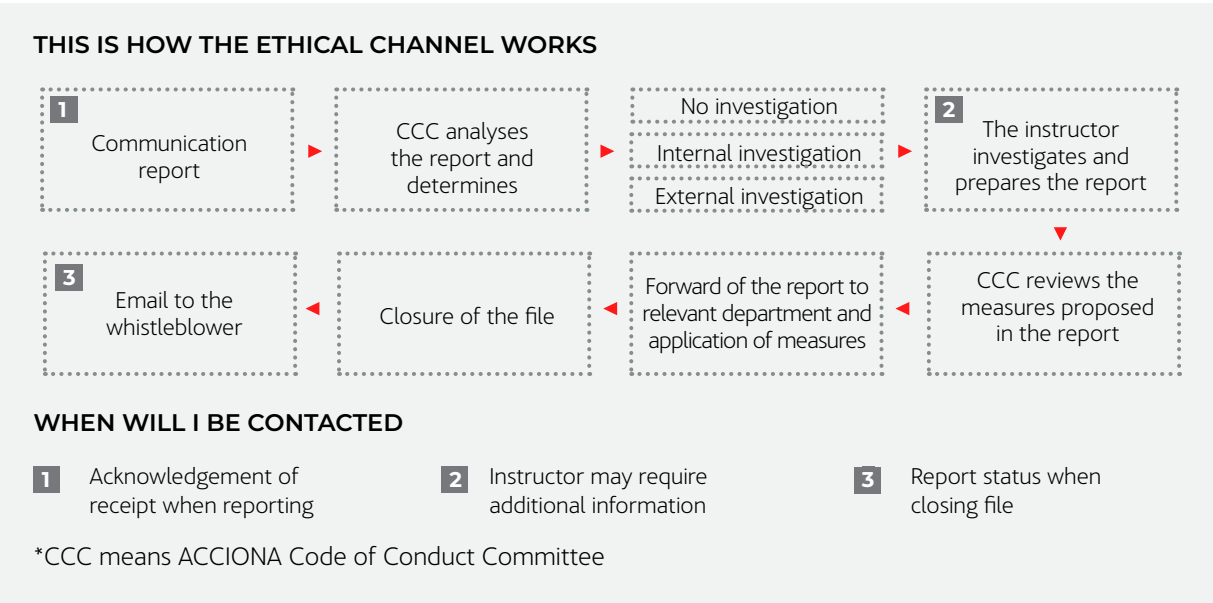
BUSINESS OPERATIONS

ACCIONA continues to maintain a zero-tolerance approach to modern slavery across its operations, supported by established policies, procedures, and operational practices that are embedded within the organisation's governance framework. As part of its commitment to awareness and prevention, ACCIONA provides mandatory Code of Conduct training to all employees through internal training platform, supplemented by the Code of Conduct Guidelines. Together, these resources address key topics including respect for human rights, the rejection of forced labour, and supply chain due diligence obligations, reinforcing the expectations placed on all personnel to identify and respond to risks of exploitation across ACCIONA's operations and supply chain.

At the operational level, ACCIONA integrates risk management into its day-to-day project delivery activities to strengthen oversight of outsourced and subcontracted labour arrangements. This includes structured subcontractor management processes, regular toolbox talks addressing worker welfare, human rights, and ethical labour practices, and active supervisor oversight to identify and escalate potential risks or concerns. Critically, ACCIONA's on-site safety management system records and maintains subcontractor information for all workers present on site, providing real-time visibility over the workforce composition, subcontracting tiers, and labour arrangements operating within each project. This capability directly supports ACCIONA's efforts to address the risks associated with limited transparency in extended supply chains by enabling the identification of unauthorised subcontracting, undisclosed labour arrangements, or indicators of exploitation at the point of delivery. These measures are designed to strengthen visibility over labour conditions on site and to support early identification of indicators of exploitation or non-compliance within the workforce and subcontractor arrangements.

Where risks or concerns relating to labour practices, human rights, or worker welfare are identified through operational activities, ACCIONA's reporting mechanisms are readily accessible. Reports can be made through protected channels, with safeguards in place to ensure confidentiality, anonymity, and protection from retaliation, as well as access to appropriate information and support. ACCIONA's global Ethical Channel remains available to employees and suppliers as a confidential mechanism to report suspected breaches of the Code of Conduct, including concerns related to human rights, forced labour, and ethical labour practices. The Ethical Channel continues to operate as a key component of ACCIONA's broader framework for identifying, escalating, and addressing potential human rights risks across its operations and supply chain. Figure 2 summarises the operation of the Ethical Channel.

SUSTAINABILITY MASTER PLAN & CODE OF CONDUCT

The Sustainability Master Plan 2025 (SMP2025) remains the overarching framework guiding ACCIONA’s Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) priorities, including supply chain management practices. The strategic focus and principles set out in SMP2025 continue to apply and direct procurement, supplier engagement, and risk management activities across the business.

Similarly, ACCIONA’s Code of Conduct continues to apply to all suppliers and business partners, reinforcing expectations around ethical behaviour, respect for human and labour rights, regulatory compliance, and environmental responsibility. These requirements remain consistent with ACCIONA’s commitments under the United Nations Global Compact, including its ten principles relating to human rights, labour standards, environmental stewardship, and anti-corruption.

Together, the SMP2025 and Code of Conduct remain key elements of ACCIONA’s framework to prevent, identify, and address modern slavery risks within its operations and supply chain, with no changes to scope or application during the 2025 reporting period.

COLLABORATION WITH SUPPLIER IN HIGH-RISK CATEGORY

In 2025, ACCIONA introduced a new initiative to further mitigate modern slavery risks associated with labour outsourcing through the establishment of formal agreements with licensed labour hire providers. This initiative strengthens oversight of labour hire arrangements by prioritising engagement with providers that operate under relevant licensing regimes and regulatory frameworks. The approach is intended to improve visibility of labour practices, reinforce compliance with employment and human rights standards, and reduce the risk of exploitation within labour-intensive project activities.

SUPPLY CHAIN

Supplier demand continued to grow in 2025, driven by the delivery of major infrastructure and renewable energy projects across Australia. ACCIONA’s supply chain governance structure remains unchanged and continues to be supported by the Supply Chain Risk Management (SCRM) model, embedded within the PROCUR-e procurement platform. The SCRM model integrates Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) risk considerations into supplier onboarding and management and remains the primary mechanism for identifying, assessing, and mitigating supply chain risks.

During 2025, ACCIONA continued to apply enhanced supplier due diligence measures, including the qualification of more than 630 major suppliers through a detailed assessment process covering a range of ESG and modern slavery related risk areas. The outcomes indicate that a high proportion of suppliers have governance frameworks in place to manage modern slavery risks, alongside demonstrated commitment to compliance and ongoing improvement.

The Supplier Risk Map remains a core component of the SCRM model and is used to identify suppliers with elevated ESG risks based on factors such as country of origin, industry exposure, and business-specific risk indicators. Mandatory control measures are applied proportionately to supplier risk and criticality, including Tier-1 supplier audits where heightened social risk is identified. In addition, ACCIONA maintains a dedicated in-country team in China to support the active management of supply chain risks and to enable rapid response to emerging issues within this key sourcing jurisdiction.

ACCIONA also continued its Tier-2 audit initiative in 2025, enabling increased visibility beyond Tier-1 suppliers and providing deeper insight into upstream supply chain risks. The audits conducted in 2025 are listed in Table 2.

INFRASTRUCTURE SUSTAINABILITY COUNCIL
– MODERN SLAVERY COALITION

In 2025, ACCIONA actively participated in the Infrastructure Sustainability Council (ISC) Modern Slavery Coalition, contributing to a sector-wide collaboration focused on strengthening modern slavery due diligence, capability and leadership across Australia and New Zealand’s infrastructure supply chains. The Coalition brings together like-minded organisation to move the industry beyond compliance-based reporting toward practical, consistent and risk-based implementation.

KEY OUTCOMES AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Throughout 2025, our engagement supported the development of practical tools, shared learning and targeted industry advocacy, aligning closely with ACCIONA’s modern slavery risk profile and procurement priorities:

STANDARDISED SUPPLIER DUE DILIGENCE

ACCIONA contributed to the ongoing development and refinement of a common modern slavery Supplier Self-Assessment Questionnaire (SAQ) for infrastructure suppliers. This work aimed to reduce duplication across clients, improve the quality of supplier responses, and strengthen upstream risk identification—particularly for labour-intensive services and higher-risk procurement categories.

LABOUR HIRE DEEP DIVE

The Coalition undertook a focused deep dive on labour hire in the infrastructure sector, examining risk drivers, regulatory controls, and practical mitigation approaches. This included development of a draft labour-hire risk profile and sector--specific guidance to improve visibility of worker conditions, licensing compliance, and subcontractor oversight, directly relevant to ACCIONA’s largest residual modern slavery risk area. As part of this initiative, ACCIONA facilitated the engagement of a licensed labour hire contractor to present at a Coalition session, sharing practical insights and good practice approaches to modern slavery risk management in labour hire, including workforce onboarding, site-based compliance measures, and the management of temporary and migrant workers in regional and remote project environments.

CAPABILITY BUILDING AND KNOWLEDGE SHARING

ACCIONA participated in structured Coalition forums, including member workshops, guest speaker sessions, and case study discussions, covering:

- Modern Slavery Act review and anticipated regulatory reforms
- Supplier mapping and traceability challenges in complex supply chains

- Practical examples of audits, grievance mechanisms, and remediation pathways
- These forums supported peer learning and informed internal improvements to ACCIONA’s procurement and supplier engagement practices.
- Industry Webinar – In December 2025, ACCIONA, in collaboration with the ISC and fellow Coalition members, collectively delivered an industry webinar focused on modern slavery risk management in the infrastructure sector. The webinar brought together representatives from across the Coalition membership to share practical insights, emerging good practice, and lessons learned in addressing modern slavery risks within infrastructure supply chains. This initiative reinforced the Coalition’s commitment to sector-wide capability building and provided a platform for cross-organisational knowledge exchange on key topics including labour hire risk management, supplier due diligence, and operational compliance measures.

STRATEGIC VALUE TO ACCIONA

Participation in the ISC Modern Slavery Coalition in 2025 delivered tangible strategic value by:

- Strengthening ACCIONA’s risk-based approach to modern slavery, particularly for labour hire and subcontracted services.
- Supporting continuous improvement of our Modern Slavery Statement through access to emerging good practice, regulatory insights and peer benchmarking.
- Enhancing ACCIONA’s reputation as a sector leader in collaborative ESG action, aligned with our broader sustainability and supply-chain risk management objectives.

ASSESSING EFFECTIVENESS AND LOOKING FORWARD
– 2026 AND BEYOND

ASSESSING EFFECTIVENESS IN 2025

ACCIONA establishes annual supply chain management quarterly targets as follows:

ACCIONA's supplier compliance performance has continued to strengthen, reflecting the sustained effectiveness of the SCRM model and the organisation's commitment to progressive improvement in supply chain governance. During the 2025 reporting period, ACCIONA maintained a compliance target of 95% for critical supplier qualification across its Australian businesses, as directed by the ultimate parent company. All Australian business units met or exceeded internal Supplier Qualification targets throughout 2025, demonstrating continued maturity in procurement and supply chain risk management practices.

During the reporting period, no whistleblower reports relating to modern slavery were received, no major non-conformities associated with modern slavery were identified through supplier audits, and no legal proceedings or regulatory actions concerning modern slavery violations were detected in respect of suppliers engaged by Australian business units. These outcomes reflect the continued effectiveness of ACCIONA's due diligence framework and reinforce the organisation's confidence in its current approach to modern slavery risk management. While ACCIONA is satisfied that its actions are delivering measurable results, it acknowledges that the identification and mitigation of modern slavery risks remains an ongoing and evolving undertaking requiring sustained vigilance, continuous improvement, and long-term commitment across its operations and supply chain.

WHAT NEXT?

In 2026, ACCIONA will focus on the following priority initiatives to further strengthen its modern slavery risk management framework:

REMEDICATION FRAMEWORK DEVELOPMENT

- ACCIONA will develop and implement a supply chain remediation framework, informed by the Walk Free Response and Remedy Framework, to establish clear and consistent processes for responding to identified instances or indicators of modern slavery within its operations and supply chain.

SUPPLY CHAIN MODERN SLAVERY AWARENESS TRAINING

- ACCIONA will deliver targeted modern slavery and supply chain risk management awareness training to project procurement teams across its Australian business units. The training program will focus on building practical capability in identifying modern slavery risk indicators during supplier engagement, and contract management.

CONSULTATION ACROSS OUR GROUP ENTITIES

ACCIONA recognises that each entity within its Group, including each of the reporting entities, plays an integral role in mitigating our risk of involvement in modern slavery.

This Statement was prepared in consultation with each reporting entity referenced in Annexure B. That consultation was enabled by:

- direct engagement with key stakeholders across the ACCIONA Infrastructure Group, including the reporting entities, specifically executive team, and senior managers from Procurement, Business Systems Assurance, Sustainability, Governance, Compliance & Legal, and Marketing & Communications teams.
- ACCIONA's management structure, specifically:
 - vertical integration of its functional departments operating across reporting entities, which facilitates an ease in information sharing and centralised access to data; and
 - regular and comprehensive whole of Group management and executive reviews and meetings that promotes a culture of collaboration and continuous improvement, not only for Statement preparation, but in day-to-day activities.

The reporting entities have a common Chief Executive Officer and overlapping directors, who reviewed this Statement prior to its endorsement by the Board.
