

Agricomm Trading Australia Pty Ltd = Anti Slavery and Human Trafficking Statement

This statement has been made in accordance with S.16 of the Modern Slavery Act 2018 and it is published by Agricomm Trading Australia Pty Ltd and its subsidiary Kambingila Pastoral Pty Ltd for the 2021/2022 financial year.

The purpose of this statement is to outline the approach Agricomm is taking within its comprehensive compliance framework to minimise the risks of modern slavery across our business and supply chain.

Our Business and Supply Chains

Agricomm employs 16 staff and is a Non-Packer Meat Exporter, sourcing meat from meat processors in Australia, all of whom have achieved the highest standard of Export and Halal accreditation.

Our subsidiary Kambingila operates three goat farms in Western Queensland, which sources all its supplies from small local companies.

Our Policies and controls

Agricomm's compliance framework to-date has been built around its accreditation with AusMeat as an approved Non-Packer Exporter, and its due diligence on suppliers is based on ensuring supplier's are licensed as an exporter by the Department of Agriculture Water and Resources.

Due to the robust nature of Australia Export licensing and employment legislation, to-date we regard our Australian supply base as being low risk of exposure to modern slavery and human tracking

Future Controls.

Over the next 12 months, we will be reviewing our supplier approval process, with the aim of assessing the compliance risk with our supplier base and incorporating modern slavery and human trafficking requirements into our supplier approval process.
